Wheeler And Woolsey At Capitol

Those past-masters in the fine art of fun-making, Bert Wheeler and Robert Woolsey in High Flyers latest comedy co-starring the famous team, opens at the Capitol Theatre today.

From smuggling jewels in a stolen police plane, to solving thefts in detective guise, and incidentally making hurricanes love to provocative beauties, the erratic but resourceful partners in merry adventure set a record pace for hilarious antics that never slackens up to the film's smashing climax.

CIRCUS DAY TOMORROW

After an absence of four years a city within a city will come to Charlottetown for a one-day stop; a city which has a population of some 700 people, hundreds of horses, camels, herds of elephants and countless other specimens of animal life, in scores of dens and cages.

It was come here tomorrow upon its own two special trains of double-length cars, all loaded to the very brim, traveling over the Canadian National Railroad from Moncton where the circus is exhibiting today.

This City of White Tops which flits about the country, has its own postmaster, garage, physician, lawyer, drug store, detectives, barber shop, wheelwright and blacksmith shops, and all the other things that go with a well-regulated community.

It is an itinerant affair that for the greater part of a season visits a new town each day and detains, erects its canvas city, delights multitudes, and then entrains and skips away to other towns and cities, there to repeat the operation. Reference is, of course, made to the Great Robbins Bros. Circus with Hoot Gibson, famous star, which will tomorrow keep open house in Charlottetown with three performances commencing at 1:30; 3:30 and 8:00 p. m. respectively. The tents will be erected just opposite the Exhibition Grounds.

Spectacular Street Parade

An immense street parade, whole city blocks in length, will be seen on the downtown streets at 11 a. m. tomorrow. More than half a hundred elaborately carved and gilded allegorical floats and tabernacles along with five trumpeting bands and two calliope will be in the picturesque cavalcade together with twenty elephants and two caravans of camels from Siberia and Asia.

It is a fair cry back to the circuses of boyhood days, from this super-circus formed through the present coalition, and while statistics don't mean so much, it is safe to say that this enormous amusement enterprise is altogether the greatest circus ever devised.

Many a staid citizen is already turning back the pages of memory to a long ago boyhood, when the circus was the biggest thing in life, and the privilege of carrying water to the large and apparently hollow elephants was an honor not lightly thrust aside.

The coming of the circus reminds many an older of the hurried slipping in the semi-darkness of the lip-toeing down the front stairs, and the rule by the railroad yards, where the red and yellow trains were "spotted" when the circus came to town. In those days the circus carried, perhaps, a half-dozen elephants, tomorrow's circus brings twenty of the bulky creatures, with all else in like proportion.

"Bigness" is the keynote throughout. Twenty-two tents of varying size are erected to house the enterprise, the biggest of these, the main tent, or "big top" seating thousands.

There will be three performances at 1:30; 3:30 and 8:00 p. m. The doors will open at 12:30; 2:00 and 7:00 p. m. to permit an inspection of the large traveling zoo, pay a visit to the side-show or listen to a concert of real circus music. Rodney Harris and his circus band will be the main performance gets under way. Reserved and general admission tickets will be on sale from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. Saturday at Hughes Drug Store for the same prices as charged on the circus grounds.

resolutions adopted by the League of Nations in support of China. As Chiang made his appeal, roads were black with slowly plodding refugees fleeing Changchow, strategic Honan Province railway junction, while civilians also fled from Hankow, south of the Yangtze River, and Canton, big port of South China.

Prepared to blast out what Chinese defenses remain in Changchow, the Japanese hauled up field artillery as they maintained a steady warplane bombing of the area.

FOREIGNERS REMAIN

Twenty-one foreigners, including a number of missionaries, remained in Changchow, from whom the health commission doctors have been withdrawn. The only line of communication is the east-west lunginal railway and the North-south Peking-Hankow line.

Strongly entrenched Chinese forces south of Changchow were reported to have beaten off repeated Japanese attempts to cut the railway.

A two-day Japanese assault on the sizeable forces from warships on both banks of the Yangtze river, and mines southward of Hankow, had failed despite heavy bombardment by enemy destroyers.

An estimated 30,000,000 Chinese already are homeless as a result of Japanese invasion. At Canton alone an estimated 500,000 have fled to the interior to escape heavy Japanese bombing attacks which began May 28.
