BOSTON, January 2.—A large schooner, floating bottom up about 200 miles south of Nantucket, was reported today by officers of the British freight Honorius, which arrived from South American ports. The derelict was said to be a menace to shipping.

HANS HOLMER WON POWDER HILL MARATHON

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Jan. 2.—Hans Holmer, formerly of Halifax, today won the annual professional modified Marathon race. He led at the finish by 20 yards and beat a large field containing many prominent international athletes. To-day was the second occasion on which Holmer carried off the event, as he was also victor in 1911.

The race was over a distance of 15 miles and Hans Holmer's time was 1 hour, 22 minutes and 12 seconds, or 27 seconds more than the time taken last year by the winner on that occasion.

Holmer was followed to the tape by George Dinning of London, England, last year's winner, and Willie Kolehmainen of Finland, the winner in 1912. The three men were closely bunched together from the ten mile mark until they entered the straight for home, when Holmer spurred and won a fine race.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. WILLIAM HOLMES

The death of Mr. William Holmes occurred at his home in Kingston on Christmas eve. Mr. Holmes was born in Kingston 55 years ago, and has always lived there. He was a man of sterling character, maintaining the confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens all through his life. For many years he was a consistent, active member of the Baptist Church and sought at all times to promote the cause of religion. He had served the Church as superintendent of the Sunday school, and was for several years an honored deacon of the church. Twenty nine years ago Mr. Holmes and Miss Katie Stevenson were united in marriage, and established the home in which he always found his greatest comfort and his most valued companionship. May their sorrow be lessened by the hope of a joyous reunion in a world where there are no partings. The surviving members of the family besides the sorrowing father and mother are: Heath and Leslie and Mrs. Joseph Morrison of Edmonton, Alta., and Grace now attending P. W. C., Charlottetown.
