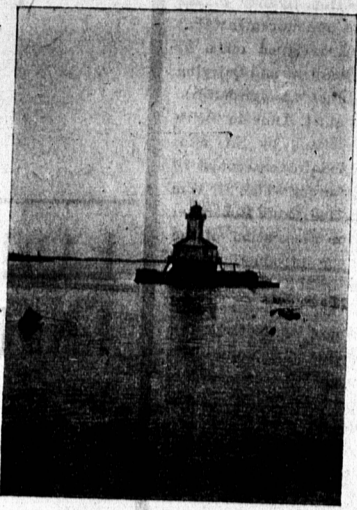

IMPROVEMENTS TO THE S'SIDE LIGHTHOUSE

"The light-house in the sea" at the mouth of Summerside harbor, one of the few light-houses in the world all surrounded by water and one of the interesting sights that attracts the eye of the stranger, has stood the test of many a storm at all seasons and running ice in fall and spring for a out thirty years. Lately it has been showing the worse of wear however, and in fact last spring was in an almost dangerous condition.



THE SUMMERSIDE LIGHTHOUSE

The break-water surrounding the lighthouse is 12 ft. high. The southeast arm 102 ft. long and the northwest arm 50 ft. long, all built of hemlock form a protection to the seas and floating ice. This work has a doubleballast floor and floating planks of 5 in. hemlocks on the outside all coated with creosote and strongly constructed.

The outer end of the south east arm which takes the blunt of the running ice in the spring is strongly protected for 15 and 18 ft on either side with a solid facing of creosoted piles heavily planked and securely fastened. Here on the east side is a jetty or landing at the light-house. Surrounding the break-water a rip-rap

work of heavy freestone as a further protection has been begun and will be finished next spring. Altogether in the construction this season about 700 tons of stone have been used and 200 tons more will be used next season. The break-water and breast-work is without doubt the nearest perfection of any work of the kind to be seen anywhere. Everything is as even and smooth as could be expected on such finer work, while the whole construction is particularly well built and perfectly solid.

The work under the supervision of the engineer of Milton Walsh with Archibald Murray as foreman carpenter with those

employed under them may well be proud of the splendid job they have made. When work resumed next spring it is intended to make a solid foundation of concrete beneath the light house up to the first floor and surround the iron tank on the outside with a casing of concrete 4 ft wide and 7 ft high. Inside there will be 4 cement buttresses to which the outside concrete work will be bound with steel spurs running through the wall. The steamer Brant which has been here mostly all summer conveying material and supplies to the workmen left yesterday afternoon with scow for Charlottetown.
