Lieut. Stevenson And the Air Line

MONCTON, Dec. 16.—Representatives of the Eastern Canada Air Line met His Worship Mayor Price and representative citizens in City Hall yesterday afternoon.

It was pointed out, that the Company intended establishing an Air Route to link Halifax, Truro, Moncton, St. John and Charlottetown, the route being however, subject to change, with two minor routes from the New Brunswick town (not yet decided upon) to connect with Portland, Boston, New York; and another route to Montreal and Quebec.

The proposal was advanced that a great land spread would be required to establish the headquarters of the Air Line. Mr. Stevenson pointed out that a stock company is in the process of formation in the city.

Mr. Stevenson said it was proposed to have about ten machines on the line, two seaplanes which would be stationed at Charlottetown and six aeroplanes for training purposes.

The Eastern Canada Air Lines was capitalized at \$500,000 and the stock is now on the market.

Mr. Stevenson expressed himself as being heart and soul in the project and along with his conference would leave no stone unturned to make the company a tremendous commercial and financial success.

The reason he had for favoring Moncton was that if the central headquarters were in this city it would mean better service by the new line.

The De Vere Company had been amalgamated with the P. E. Island Company to form the new organization.

The possibilities of the new medium of traffic were great he said. Freight, mail and passengers would be carried.

As an instance of the success of the air machine in the Maritime Province, Mr. Stevenson said a recent flight had been made from Truro to Charlottetown, a distance of 75 miles in 45 minutes.

He took great pleasure in listening to the plan outlined by Mr. Stevenson and the future air routes with Moncton as headquarters.

Mr. Stevenson addressed the Council stating that he felt the matter was well worth being carefully enquired into.

No rush should be made by the Council members into the project until everything was made clear.
