The Late Mrs. Rev. David Sutherland

The remains of the late Mrs. (Rev.) David Sutherland, whose death occurred at Moncton at midnight on Wednesday, Dec. 19th, arrived in Charlottetown by the early train last night. The body was conveyed to the home of Mr. Murdoch Ross, 41 Upper Prince Street, where it will remain until 2.15 this afternoon, leaving the house for Zion Presbyterian Church, where service will be held. Interment People's Cemetery.

The late Mrs. Sutherland was widely known, both in Charlottetown and in many parts of this province. She was a native of Halifax, N.S., and some of her relatives still reside there. She came of a well-known Nova Scotia family, and during the time that her husband was pastor of one of the Presbyterian churches in Halifax city, she became acquainted not only with the members of the congregation, but also with many in the north end vicinity where his church was situated.

Mrs. Sutherland, however, spent the greater part of her life in Charlottetown. The late Mr. Sutherland was inducted as pastor of Zion Church in December, 1890, and removed from Halifax with his wife and their small family, to this city. He continued as minister of this congregation until his death which took place in the summer of 1898. Therefore, he was eight years in that pastorate and was justly regarded as a preacher of rare eloquence and a pastor who was beloved by all. It is thirty years since his demise, and for the greater part of that period, Mrs. Sutherland resided in this city. It may easily be said that for nearly thirty-five years she had her residence amongst our people.

The late Mrs. Sutherland not only in the congregation to which her husband ministered, but in this city generally, was always regarded with sincere affection and the highest esteem. She always took a deep and active interest in the various activities of the congregation, both as the pastor's wife and for years after he had been laid to rest in the People's Cemetery. For quite a number of years, she was Secretary-Treasurer of Zion Church, and in all the departments in which she took such a lively interest, she performed her part as a Christian lady, and one who ever had the interests of the congregation and of the community at heart. She aims at accuracy in her endeavours. Being of an exceedingly friendly social disposition, she endeavored herself to the congregation and to all with whom she was associated.

It might be said, however, that though little beyond the prime of life at the time of her departure, yet she had passed through deep waters of affliction, first in the untimely death of her husband, Rev. David Sutherland, and afterwards by the loss of her gallant son, Lieutenant Douglas Sutherland, who made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. These strokes of sorrow shattered her physical health and strength, and for some years past, she had been in very delicate health. All who knew her in this city will respect her memory and mourn her passing. Her last hours were soothed by the presence of her daughter, Mrs. Cruikshank, and her son, Gordon, who were with her until her gentle spirit took its flight to Him who gave it.

The members of the family are: William, Manager of the Bank of Montreal, Monterrey, Mexico; Gordon in the C. N. R. offices in Moncton; Mrs. Cruikshank (Dorothy) at Pearsboro, N. S.; two sisters, Mrs. E. A. Skinner, and Miss Florence Westerdale, of Halifax. (Halifax and Moncton papers please copy)

This gave the advantage to Australian raisins, which were of

equally good quality. The Australian shippers however lost this advantage by improper methods of packing. Roddy closed his address with an anecdote relevant to his recent holiday. Chairman Cleaver MacLean tendered the thanks of the club in which he was ably supported by Henry and Jack. The meeting closed with The King.
