The prisoner, Joseph Carver who is in the Queen's County jail under sentence of death for the murder of Alexander Stewart has not greatly changed since the fatal word was pronounced on him in July last. He is still in expectation of a commutation of the death sentence to imprisonment for life by the Governor General in council and a petition to that effect signed by a number of the clergy and his friends has been forwarded to Ottawa and the receipt acknowledged by the Secretary of State. Carver has had during the past three weeks as his spiritual advisor Rev. O. B. Emery of this City. The prisoner, however, did not express any urgent request for a clergyman and the visits of Mr. Emery are more owing to the good offices of the Sheriff than to any spirit of repentance on the part of the prisoner. The latter, it is thought by those who have intercourse with him will become more sullen and untractable should no mercy be extended to him by the authorities. It is understood that the report of the Chief Justice on the case will be forwarded to Ottawa in the course of a few days but its nature is of course unknown.
