"HIAVEN ONLY KNOWS" IS FULL OF SURPRISES

Today the Prince Edward Theatre brings forth the gayest, most entertaining and "full of surprises" tale of the west in many a day. With Robert Cummings and Brian Donlevy tackling the starring roles with gusto, "Heaven Only Knows" tells the story of a ruthless gambler and his obstacle course to romance.

Beauteous Jorja Curtright, Texas' newest gift to the roster of leading ladies supplies the love interest in the part of a small-town school teacher, whose inherent objections to Donlevy's money-making activities need strenuous overcoming. Marjorie Reynolds, as a pert dance hall hostess in Donlevy's saloon, does her best - and very good it is too (though she is apparently not quite persuasive enough) - to lead Cummings from the straight and narrow.

The rudeness of life in the west, circa 1885, is supplied by Bill Goodwin as Donlevy's rival in the saloon field and partner in a virtually defunct copper mine. Stuart Erwin as a lazy sheriff who prefers fishing to maintaining - or rather reinstating - much needed law and order, and Edgar Kennedy, bewigged for the first time in his 35-year motion picture career, as the town drunk.

John Lillet does nobly in his part of Miss Curtright's father, the local minister and Lurene Tuttle, who has established an indelible reputation on Radio Row, plays the part of a town-woman whose eight-year old son idolizes Donlevy, gambling, shooting or no. In the part of the young worshipper at Donlevy's tenuous throne, Peter Miles, a relative newcomer to the Hollywood scene, provides a strong scene-stealing threat to the stars and walks away easily with the reputation of being one of the screen's most appealing youngsters.

Russian Bogey Doesn't Scare Stolid Finns

HELSINKI, April 1 - (AP) - Worn by two wars within a decade and with new Russian threats over their heads, Finns still are keeping a stiff upper lip.

Finns have seen hard times and are accustomed to occupations. They even had a civil war. Hardships do not frighten them and they do not give in. Under the new political pressure they are saying: "We must not be driven into a panic. We must make the best of the situation and fight tenaciously but calmly for our western way of life and ideals. If we are closed in behind the iron curtain and lose our American credits and our business with the west our plight will be hard indeed."

Crisis or no crisis, life in Helsinki is going on as before. "Business as usual," is a deep-rooted slogan with the Finns. In fact, it is much more than a slogan, it is a way of life.

It is very dark in Helsinki at night, almost a half black-out because of the necessity to save power for industry. Most stores close at 5 o'clock and the restaurants at 11 p.m. There is hardly any night life and people go to bed early. The traffic is not heavy. It is hard to get a taxi and small cabs drawn by skinny horses are typical.

There are a few good theatres and movies, but the principal Finnish pleasure still is heavy drinking. Wine is practically nonexistent but beer is almost non-alcoholic but the Finns drink amazing quantities of hard liquor although it is heavily taxed.

Restaurants Expensive  
Food is all right in the restaurants if you take the expensive a-lacarte courses. Meat is plentiful, but white bread, sugar, butter and milk are scarce and rationed. Real coffee can be had but it costs 150 marks in the restaurants - almost as much as a good meat course.

Prices are generally high and the inflation means that salaried persons - civil servants and office workers - cannot afford to go places or give parties.

There is a widespread black market, especially in foreign currencies, Swedish crowns and dollars bring three times as much on the black market as in the regular banks. Much smuggling of money is going on.

The workmen have had many raises and skilled men and artisans now are getting ten times as much pay as before the war and only half of their former real wages. That means they must have more than one job to get along. Many scientists have gone to foreign countries, and this is considered as a potential danger for Finnish cultural life. Many skilled workers work only three weeks a month because of the progressive taxes.

The housing shortage is severe. No one has the right to more than one room and in large flats the original occupants have had to admit other families who take over some of the rooms and share the kitchen and other facilities.
