### THE ATLANTIC MAIL EXPERIMENT.

A glance at the map and a table of distances is not assuring as to the success of the experiment in carrying the Atlantic mails via Sydney. From the beginning of July the common route for steamers plying between St. Lawrence ports and the Mother Country is that north of Newfoundland passing through the straits of Belleisle. To deliver the mails at Sydney the steamers must go and come south of Newfoundland by the longer route. A western bound steamer coming by the northern route would land the mails at Rimouski where they would be taken by rail to Montreal, the distance in sections being as follows:

Moville to Belleisle.....	1712 miles
Belleisle to Rimouski.....	731 "
Rimouski to Montreal (rail).....	343 "
<b>Total 2786 "</b>	

By the southern route the steamer and rail distances are as follows:

Moville to Cape Race.....	1740 miles
Cape Race to Sydney.....	306 "
Sydney to Montreal (rail).....	911 "
<b>Total 2957 "</b>	

It will be seen from the above tables that the route via Sydney now being tested is 207 miles between Moville and Montreal as against 2786 miles by the northern route, the difference being 171 miles. As against this difference the Sydney route would have nearly 400 miles less of mail carriage by steamer, and 508 more by rail. Railway speed will be swifter than the steamer, but it may be doubted whether the mails will reach Montreal any quicker if as quick as by the northern route. The Maritime Provinces would gain, of course by the adoption of the Sydney route. It is regrettable that the fog on the Newfoundland Banks prevented a satisfactory test on the first trip, but apart from this the outlook for any signal success is not very promising.

### MINISTER HYMAN'S PICNIC.

The new Minister of Public Works believes that Canada's growing time should also be a feeding time. To that end and presumably also to show fitting gratitude for his recent triumphant re-election, he entertained his constituents at London the other day in princely fashion. The affair took the form of a mammoth picnic in one of the city parks, with a feed in the large agricultural hall. A despatch tells that twenty-five thousand ham sandwiches, 250 gallons of ice cream, seven thousand bags of candy, 5,000 cigars, 400 jelly rolls, angel and layer cakes, 15 barrels of lemonade, one hundred dozen soft drinks and 800 dozen bananas were divided among the hungry multitude. Twelve hundred people were admitted at a time to the Agricultural Hall, where tables were spread, and 20 minutes were allotted each company of guests. The tables were refilled ten times, and the work of serving the crowds was continued from 4 to 8 o'clock.

It will be seen that the "tuck-in" was a generous one. Tables for 1200 people filled ten times would make a total of 12,000 who went through the knife and fork exercise at Mr. Hyman's expense, besides smoking his cigars and enveloping his barrels of soft drink. As for the

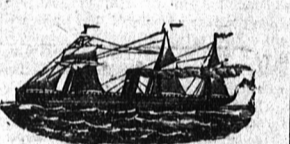

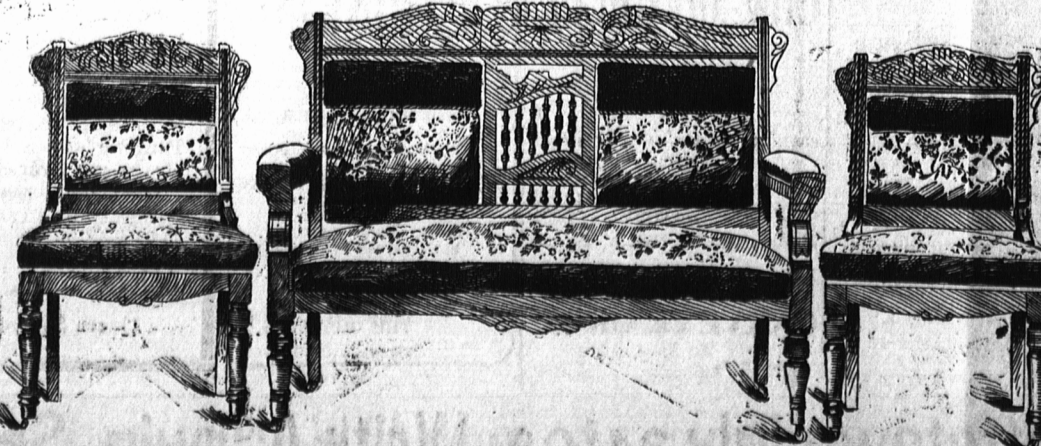
