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Cranberry Fruit Worm Control

(Science Service News) The cranberry fruit worm is one of the most serious of the insect pests with which cranberry growers have to contend. The insect passes the winter as a pupa in a full grown caterpillar, pupates in the spring, and emerges as a moth to lay its eggs at the time cranberries are nearly past blooming. The eggs are laid in the calyx, cures of the berries and after hatching, the tiny caterpillars enter the berries, usually from the stem end. The interior of the berry is consumed as the caterpillar increases in size and one insect may attack and destroy from three to five berries. Infested berries turn prematurely yellow and some may disappear by picking time owing to the drying up and collapsing of the outer skin.
