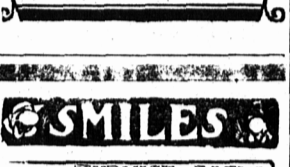

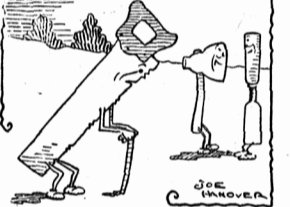

The foundation is four feet below the surface, well bedded in concrete and yet high enough at the base to take three concrete steps 12 feet x 8 feet, with an 8-inch rise and 12-inch tread, which adds greatly to its appearance. This part was designed by the five lady trustees of the People's Cemetery, in which it stands, and was built by Mr. Walter Rogerson, St. Patrick's Road, and certainly does Mr. Rogerson credit.
