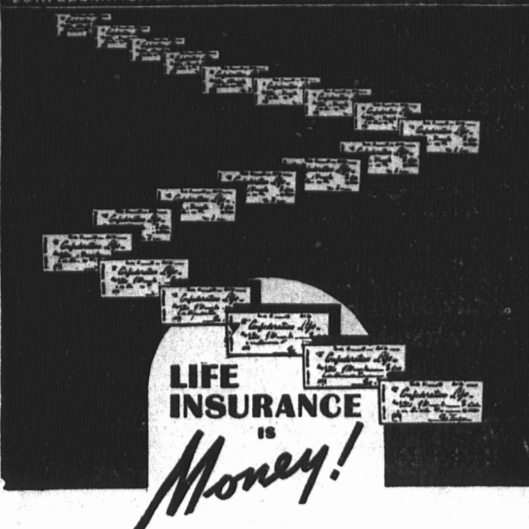

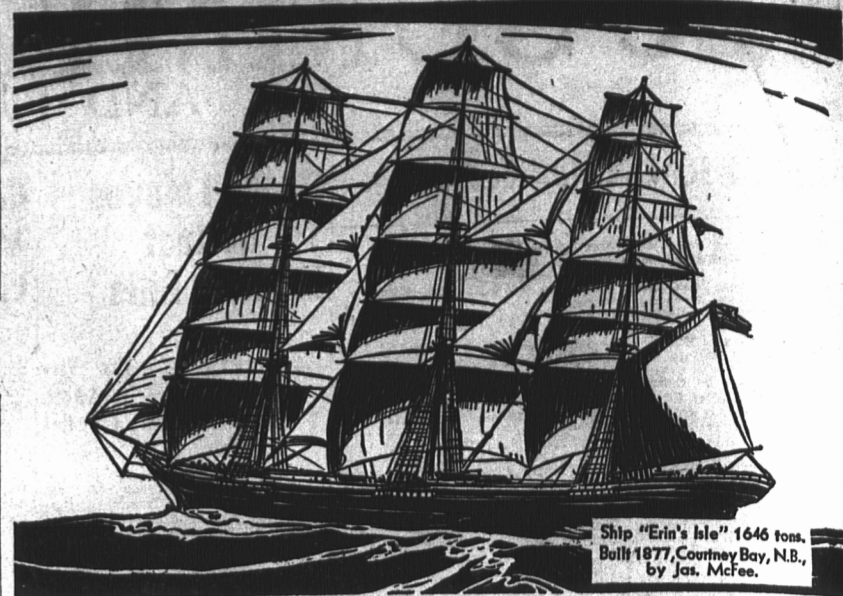
STRANGE TALES OF MISERS

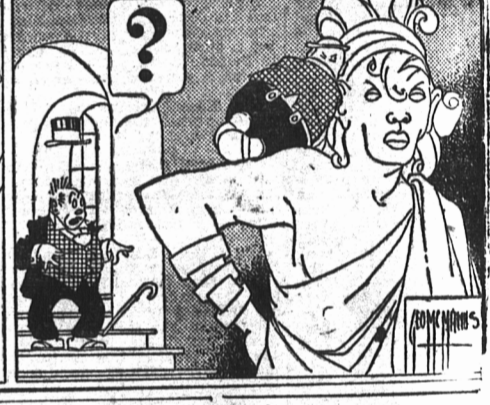
