—MASS MEETING.—The people of Summerside turned out in masses Sunday evening to attend the mass meeting held in Happyland Hall under the direction of the Red Shield Committee. Mr. Creelman McArthur, occupied the chair and with him on the platform were Messrs. T.D. Ramsay, Neil McLeod, D.J. Bonnell, W.J. Lidstone and L.R. Allen, members of the organizing committee and Capt. Alfred Steele speaker of the evening. A musical program occupied the first part of the evening which included quartettes by Messrs W.E. Forbes, B. Johnston, Geo. Bowness, and Earl Schurman, also solo by Rev. Mr. Wheeler. The chairman then introduced Capt. Steele and gave a few complimentary remarks on the wonderful work done by the Salvation Army during the war. He described the object of the Red Shield Drive and asked the citizens to be prepared to give freely during the week and reach their objective which is placed at \$1,000 and if possible "go over the top". In concluding he asked that in order to keep up the good work and to aid the returning men and their dependents that during the drive that the citizens give as freely as possible.
