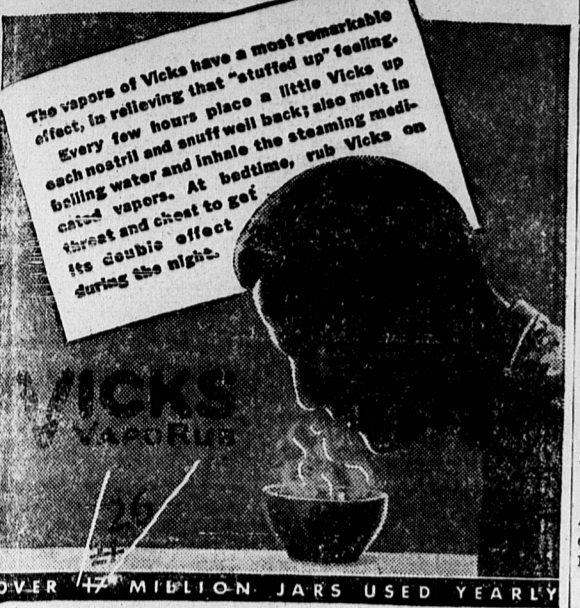


FOR HEAD COLDS

Mrs. Raeford Locke, of Haliburton, is spending a week at her old home in Alberton.

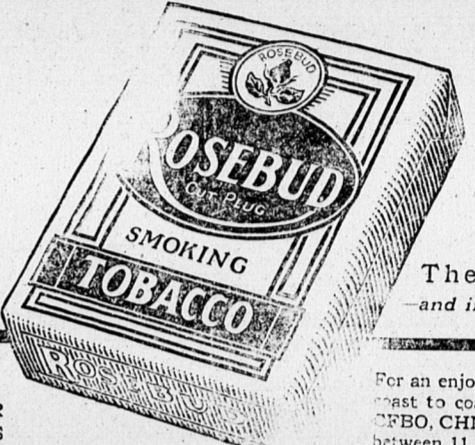
Mrs. Harold McLennan, of the Queen Hotel, is spending a holiday as the guest of her mother, Mrs. John Locke.

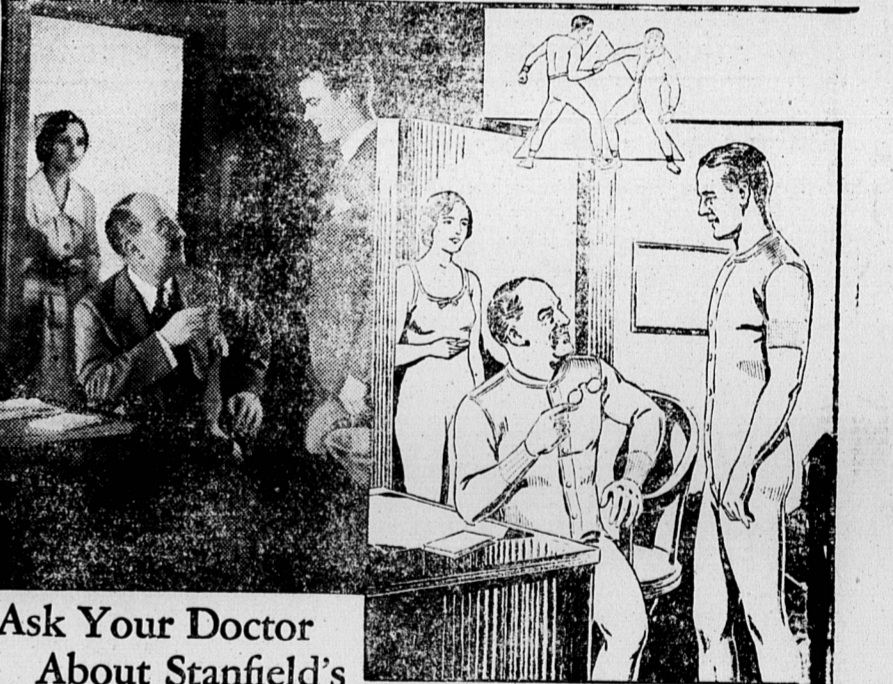
