

EVERY GENEROUS RESPONSE

Recent Appeal Made By C. W. L. For Suffering People of Southern Sask., Met With Hearty Response By People of Island.

About three weeks ago an appeal was made by the Catholic Women's League through the Charlottetown press for aid in the form of clothing, bedding, provisions, potatoes, etc., for the suffering people of the devastated areas of Southern Saskatchewan and as always, our Prince Edward Island people responded most generously and promptly.

From Charlottetown over one and one half tons of clothing was packed and shipped. St. Ann's, Lot 65, sent a splendid consignment of over five hundred pounds. Miscouche also shipped a large amount of clothing and bedding. The good people of Rustico contributed splendidly as did also families from Glenfinnan. Other districts sent cases of goods, but the complete report is not as yet available.

Besides the clothing, etc., ten carloads of potatoes and vegetables have been shipped or are about to be shipped this week. Cape River parish, Rev. W. V. MacDonald, D.D., Pastor, Borden parish, Rev. Wm. Monaghan, D.D., pastor; have each shipped a car. Kelly's Cross, Rev. Clarence Pitt, Pastor, and St. Ann's, Lot 65, Rev. Leo Herrell, Pastor, have jointly filled and shipped a carload; Alberton, Rev. Terrence Campbell; Miscouche, Rev. Martin Monaghan, D.D.; Fort Augustus, Rev. P. D. Croken; Vernon River, Rev. P. D. McGulgan; Souris, Rev. J. A. McLean, A.P.V.G.; Bedford and Corran Bay, Rev. J. B. MacIntyre, are assembling carloads which will be shipped this week.

Another carload will be assembled at Vernon River later on. All shipments have been made direct to the Saskatchewan Relief Commission, who send directions to the points of shipment.

The distribution is in the hands of a provincial relief commission and is given where need is greatest, regardless of race or creed.

The members of the C. W. L. of Charlottetown, opened a subscription list for those who wished to make a small cash donation, and each giving a small offering, a quite respectable sum has already come in.

To further augment this subscription, Mrs. Wm. Flynn, of Euston St., very generously donated a wonderful three-storey fruit cake, beautifully decorated which is on display in Reddin Bros window and is being lotteried at a very modest price for the tickets. This cake will be drawn for next week, so the lucky winner will have a Christmas cake second to none. C. W. L. members are selling the tickets and they are certainly in demand.

So, taken all in all, many of our good Island people will enjoy their own Christmas cheer more heartily knowing they have done their bit to make a little more comfortable the lives of other Canadians whose burdens are heavy and who, through no fault of their own, are suffering want and privation. To all who have so generously helped in the relief program, the Catholic Women's League, speaking for His Excellency Archbishop McGulgan, and the Saskatchewan Relief Commission, for which they have acted as agent, are deeply grateful.

Churchill In Auto Accident

LONDON, Dec. 14.—(A.P.)—Great Britain was shocked today at news from New York that Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, had been seriously injured in an automobile accident.

He has played a lone hand in politics recently, but he remains an outstanding figure in British public life. In the last session of Parliament he was a more dominating figure than some of the Cabinet Ministers.

Sometimes he had been called the "Peter Pan" of British politics, and no one knows when he will put on some unexpected and dazzling exhibition of youthful high spirits.

The range of his accomplishments is astounding. Some critics regard him as one of the best writers in the country. He is a painter of considerable ability. His versatility extends even to his hats, which in their varying and original design have become a keen source of interest in Britain. He has probably held more Cabinet posts than any other man in England, but the office of Prime Minister, highest of them all, so far has eluded him.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—An "uncomplicated pleurisy" has been developed by Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill as a consequence of the injuries he suffered when struck by a taxicab, but the noted British Statesman was described late tonight by his physicians as "progressing favorably."

Plan World Wide Soccer
LONDON, England, Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—Brig. General Critchley, of the Greyhound Racing Association, has decided to ask the Football Association for their approval of a scheme that is the most interesting the soccer game has known for many years. It is that an entirely new competition be instituted that will be open to the world.

The prize for the winning team will be \$5,000 (about \$20,000) and the expenses of all the teams who enter will be met by the G. R. A. So that there will be no clashing with League fixtures the tournament will be started immediately after the season officially ends or if it is more suitable the first games will be played the week following the Cup Final at Wembley.

The venue will be the White City London, and the only stipulation made is that the competition must be completed within ten days.

General Critchley believes that applications will be received from France, Germany, Belgium, Spain, Italy and most other countries on the Continent in addition to a tremendous number of British clubs. The competition, actually, would be

February banned imports of Russian coal, lumber and timber, wood pulp, pulp wood, asbestos and furs. This action was taken under an amendment to the customs act which gave to the Government authority to prohibit importation of goods from any country not a contracting party to the Treaty of Versailles.

The banning of furs from Russia developed considerable opposition from furriers of Canada. Protests were made to the Government with a view to having the order-in-council amended so as to permit the entry of raw furs. It was contended that if Canada was to manufacture fur coats and other garments in conformity with latest styles, Russian furs must be available for trimming, etc. On the other side the view was expressed that furriers should be content to utilize Canadian furs.

At the time the February order-in-council was passed it was stated by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of National Revenue, that the action was taken because of working conditions and Communist activities in Russia.

During the fiscal year ended March 31, 1930, the imports of undressed furs direct from Russia was \$212,982. However, this is believed to have been only a small portion of the total importation, the bulk of it coming via the United States and Great Britain.

Duty Fixed
OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 14.—Minimum values for duty of imported cotton fabrics and artificial silk fabrics were fixed by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of National Revenue in a bulletin issued to customs collectors today. The values in Canadian money follow:

Tweeds, suitings, paintings, and similar fabrics, wholly of cotton, weighing 6 oz. or more per square yard 25 cents per pound.

Flannelettes, robe cloths, blanket, blanket cloths and similar napped fabrics, wholly of cotton, weighing 6 oz. or more per square yard, 40 cents per pound.

Flannelettes, robe cloths, blanket cloths and similar napped fabrics, wholly of cotton, weighing less than 6 oz. per square yard, 44 cents per pound.

Woven fabrics, composed wholly of artificial silk, when dutiable under tariff item 581, \$1.25 per pound.

The foregoing values in Canadian currency represent the values F. O. B. mill for regular duty on importations from all foreign countries, whether their currency is appreciated or depreciated.

No Announcement
OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 14.—Cabinet Council had a two hour sitting today. At the conclusion of the meeting, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister, stated there was no announcement to make. An accumulation of routine matters and a general discussion, it is understood, largely engaged the attention of the Cabinet. Another meeting is scheduled for tomorrow.

reported to have been found in his pocket after Nova Scotia police arrived, but the name of the writer was not at once disclosed.

Twelve days ago Myles Simpson's body was found in the waters of West River. A jury returned an "accidental drowning" verdict, but neighbors wondered how a cripple could have covered the distance from his home to the river without crutches. An investigation resulted in exhumation. Autopsy by Dr. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax medical examiner, indicated the young man was dead when his body entered the river.

A few hours after Gilbert Simpson, brother of Myles, had returned with his sister and another brother from Bridgewater on Sunday, Gilbert smashed the windows in the home, took a gun from a neighbor's house and went into the woods. An hour later he came out with part of his head shot away, and was able to say that he had tripped on the gun. He is in Bridgewater hospital, not expected to live.

Police, already probing the death and Myles and Gilbert's shooting, now are faced with the killing of Smith. The Nineveh man had been working in the woods with two companions, but some distance away, when he was shot.

Third Victim Dies
Somewhere in the rainswept hills that lie between the little villages of Nineveh and Pleasant River, Naaman Smith hides tonight. Closing in about the lumber camps where he may seek shelter are constables of the Nova Scotia police, resolved to take the twenty two year old youth alive for the murder of Lemuel Smith, middle aged farmer, who dropped dead in the woods today, his axe in his hand, a bullet fairly between the eyes.

And police are guarding the home of Nay Smith, Lemuel's brother, who was one of four other intended victims named in a note found in a discarded raincoat, signed by the Naaman, and announcing the killing of Lem.

When Lem Smith fell lifeless today it marked the third violent death in this district in two weeks, the tenth in the last dozen years. Gilbert Simpson, of Simpson's Corners, near here, died this afternoon in Bridgewater Hospital. He had staggered into his home yesterday, part of his head shot away, and just able to say that he had tripped over his gun. Ten days before, his crippled brother Myles had been found dead in West River. A post mortem established there was no water in his lungs. Gilille, who was working in a lumber camp at the time of his brother's death, had returned home and had been questioned by police. Yesterday he flew into a rage, smashed the household furniture, borrowed a gun, and stalked off into the woods.

No connection is suggested by police between the Smith and Simpson deaths. They expect further developments in both. Inquests are to be held tomorrow.

A motive for the killing of Lemuel Smith, believed to be divulged in the note found a short distance from his body, was not disclosed by police.

Smith, with his two sons, Donald, 20, and Laurie, 16, and Milford Veniot, whose name with those of Lloyd Veniot, Fay Smith, Lem Smith and Glenn Lowe appeared in the note, were cutting timber this forenoon on the woodlot owned by Lynville Herman. They worked a short distance apart, with Donald nearest his father. Without warning, a shot punctuated the ringing of axes. Lem Smith fell to the ground instantly killed. He was shot between the eyes. Axes in hand, the three gathered about the crumpled figure, smoke trailing from the muzzle of a rifle. It was Veniot who went to telephone for police while Donald told his mother what had occurred. Laurie was crazed from shock.

Nova Scotia police, who had been investigating the mystery at Simpson's Corners, were on the scene in a few minutes. Meanwhile, searchers following the trail of footprints in the snow found the rain-coat, which was turned over to the constables.

Police from Chester, Lunenburg and Mahone Bay were thrown in a cordon around the woods tonight. They guarded the home of Gates Smith, father of Naaman, as well as others in the neighborhood. Doors never before locked were bolted fast.

No motive was ascribed by settlers for the sudden action of the youth with the biblical name who lived in the village with the same distinction. Naaman Smith was known as a quiet lad, a noted marksman. There is no known relationship between the Smith fam-

throughout the city and country that it was Falconwood Hospital which was on fire.

About 11 o'clock, after many unsuccessful inquiries, dynamite was finally obtained and a charge was set at the edge of the east wing with the object of severing this part from the burning section of the building. There was no result except the blowing out of a few windows.

About 12 o'clock a cat was seen in a third storey window above the main entrance, it jumped to the roof of the balcony, about 15 feet, where it stayed for some time until firemen procured a ladder and rescued it.

Some apprehension was caused by the presence of casks of turpentine in the basement. An explosion probably from this cause occurred about 12.30 blowing out several basement windows.

At 11 o'clock the cupola in the central part of the building was a mass of flames and at 11.05 it crashed in.

At 12.40 the entire upper part of the east wing was ablaze, at the same time the fire was working its way into the east wing through the basement.

receding shores of the continent—perhaps for the last time. Then he scribbled with his left hand the following message for the Associated Press:

"Upon saying farewell to Europe I cannot help expressing my sorrow that my stay has been all too brief. I had conceived of a prolonged tour of the principal countries of Europe, as well as Turkey, Palestine and Egypt.

"But the peremptory call of duty upset my plans, I must hurry back to India. But I am carrying the richest treasure of memories.

"My contact with English statesmen, their unflinching courtesy, the deep affection of the English poor in whose midst I was privileged to live, the warm reception given me by the citizens of Paris, the sublime beauty of Switzerland, the simple manner in which the Swiss adopted me as one of their own, the sacred intimacy with Romain Rolland and two busy days in ancient Rome are memories I shall never forget.

"They increase my faith in the essential goodness of human nature and brace me for whatever ordeal may be in store for my country and me."

Advices Canada To Trade In South America
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—While the republics of Venezuela and Colombia have felt the world-wide economic depression very keenly, both countries have been singularly free from political disturbances and should, consequently, recover more rapidly than some of the other South American republics, according to J. A. Strong, Canadian Trade Commissioner for Panama, Venezuela and Colombia. Interviewed when in Montreal recently to confer with local manufacturers over Canadian exports to those three countries, Mr. Strong expressed the opinion that Canada would do well to turn its eyes toward South America, viewing nations on that continent as potential markets of increasing value.

The trio of republics over which Mr. Strong's trade jurisdiction extends grant no trade preferences to any nation, thus offering the Dominion of Canada sound opportunities of competing with Dutch, British and American manufacturing interest on an equal basis.

Mr. Strong has been in Canada since August last, meeting manufacturers throughout the country in an effort to encourage the Canadian exporting to the three South American republics of such commodities as wheat, flour, milk, canned salmon, codfish, potatoes, confectionery, paper products and newsprint, rubber products, leather, agricultural machinery and tools, building and construction materials, aluminum products, copper wire, paints, cement, etc.

Prisoners Represent Many Callings
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 14.—(By The Canadian Press) — Practically every phase of man's work—electricity, machinery, inventions, sculpture, painting, poetry, writing, engraving—has some representative in some prison or penitentiary. Caught in crime, these talented prisoners generally return to their original trades and hobbies when they are within prison walls and often produce work of outstanding merit.

The entire lock system of the St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, just north of Montreal on the Riviere des Prairies, was invented by a prisoner, a former locksmith, about 35 years ago. No one seems to know the actual details of the story but the general rumor is that he was given his freedom because of this deed. In one of the offices of the same penitentiary hangs a life-sized oil-painting of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, in riding suit, done from memory about three years ago by one of the oldest inmates of the prison. He is now serving a life sentence. The painting is said to be one of the finest portraits of the Prince.
