The deceased was but a young man about 23 years of age, and was formerly in business in this city with his brother, under the name of Dingwell Bros. Death was due to heart trouble. The body of the late William A. Hickson arrived in Newcastle yesterday forenoon from Montreal, accompanied by Mrs. Hickson, the Misses Hickson, Cecil Rippeil, of Montreal, and Robert Hickson, of Bathurst. The funeral party was met at the depot by a large body of prominent citizens, headed by Rev. Dr. H. T. Cousins, and a procession was formed which preceded the body to Mr. Hickson's late residence. At the semi-annual meeting of the Book Committee of the Methodist Church in Canada, eastern section, last held, Rev. W. Mosher, book steward. General satisfaction was expressed at the improved appearance of the Wesleyan, and the secretary was instructed to convey congratulations to the new publishing company. Still further improvement is contemplated. High appreciation of Dr. Johnson's difficult work as editor was also expressed. The financial statement was the most satisfactory in years. 

Wellington Camp returned to the city yesterday afternoon after attending the sessions of the Baptist Foreign Mission Board in Toronto, at which a dominion mission board agreed upon the amalgamation of the Maritime, Quebec-Ontario and Western boards. The deceased had been an invalid for a number of years. A week after the death of her husband, who passed away on April 9th, she was taken to the P. E. I. Hospital for treatment. The deceased was a native of Murray Harbor and leaves to mourn the following sons and daughters: John and Watson, in Boston, Lee in Australia, Mrs. (Conductor) John McDonald, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Dr. Harrington of Boston. The funeral will take place this morning at Georgetown on the arrival of the train from Charlottetown.

Cyclone Burns, a Boston wrestler who competed in Charlottetown, is reported badly injured following a bout with Americus. Burns was thrown heavily in the second bout, landing on his neck and shoulders and appeared stunned when taken to his dressing room. Burns lost the match in two straight falls, the first going one hour and twelve minutes and the second eleven minutes and twenty seconds. It was the best match in the city for a long time and a large gallery was present. It was a spectacular match. Americus, with his superior knowledge of the mat game, had Burns on the defensive the greater part of the match, but at times the big Swede flashed and kept the Baltimore man busy squirming out of tight holds.


