### Czech Government Moves To Oppose Vatican Order Will Comprise 150 Units

#### Suitability Of Site For New Naval Barracks Still Being Considered

#### Sees No Cause For Gloom In Fishing Industry

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 15 — (CP) — Fisheries Minister Dewar said tonight he believes dollar-savings policies in the West Indies will have no effect on the sale of Canadian fish there.

The Minister, here on an inspection tour of North Atlantic fisheries, said West Indians "consider cod for breakfast as essential as a Scot does oatmeal." He was addressing a meeting of the Newfoundland Press Club.

#### Turns Down Recount Request In Toronto

TORONTO, July 15 — (CP) — Judge Robert Forsyth decided today against holding a judicial recount of ballots in Toronto Greenwood constituency, won by Progressive Conservative J. E. McMillan, in the June 27 Dominion election. Earlier, Judge Forsyth approved a recount application made by S. Perry Ryan, the Liberal candidate, who lost to Mr. McMillan by a 44-vote margin.

#### Scouts Begin To Gather For Big Jamboree

OTTAWA, July 15 — (CP) — Bell tents and marquees sprang up today on sprawling Connaught Rifle Ranges as Boy Scouts gathered for the first Canadian jamboree.

Come Monday 3,000 top Scouts from many points in Canada and the United States will bed down for nine days camping on the site of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association's annual competition, 14 miles west of Ottawa. They now are on their way by train and bus.

The words of Camp Chief Ell Boyaner, of Saint John, N. B., they're coming "to strengthen the bonds of friendship between the widely separated parts of this great Dominion. The jamboree will cement the century old friendship with our neighbors to the south. This jamboree will help make Canada strong."

Chief Scout Viscount Alexander, Governor-General, in a message of welcome said:

"This is a splendid opportunity for each of you to get to know others from across this broad and beautiful land. Make the most of it, and when you return to your homes, you will be wiser and happier in the knowledge that you know someone from every part of Canada."

Four tent villages will house the Scouts. Five hundred bell tents and 50 marquees will dot the landscape of this five-square-mile rifle range.

In addition to the American Scouts, fifteen Scout leaders from Cuba will attend the jamboree as observers. They hope to absorb ideas for a proposed Cuban jamboree in 1950.

#### Expect Flow Of Overseas Immigrants To Lessen

WASHINGTON, July 15 — (AP) — The United States expects a steel strike today as the industry's biggest corporations accepted President Truman's 60-day peace plan under vigorous protest.

A fact-finding board appointed by him late today will study the deadlocked dispute over a fourth round of post-war wage raises — also pensions and group insurance — and will make recommendations.

The United Steelworkers (U.I.O.) have demanded a substantial raise, mentioning 20 cents an hour as a possible figure. The big steel companies have refused to grant any raise, saying it would hurt the economy.

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#### Canada Seeking New Air Route To The Orient

OTTAWA, July 15 — (CP) — Canada, ever on the search for new commercial air lanes, will attempt to strike a deal with the U.S. to use its stop-over points for a Trans-Atlantic flight, in return for the right to do bigger air business in U.S. territory.

France has made no move to renew her air agreement with the Dominion.

In return for continued use of the Gander Airport, Canada will ask the U.K. to let the Dominion use the FJI Islands and Hong Kong as stop-over points for a Trans-Pacific line Canada hopes to open to the Orient.

She may also ask for extension of Canada's air rights in the United Kingdom where trans-Canada Air Lines now use Prestwick and London Airports as terminating points for picking up and dropping off passengers.

Similar rights held by the United States and French air lines, also terminated, but Canada gave the three countries a three-month extension through an exchange of

#### Expect Flow Of Overseas Immigrants To Lessen

OTTAWA, July 15 — (CP) — More than 300,000 immigrants from practically every country in the world have reached Canada since the end of the war, but the movement is expected to be curtailed in coming months as a result of emigration barriers raised by most European countries.

A Resources Department official said today that as a result of the European barriers it was a fair assumption that Canada will encourage the movement of immigrants from the United States in coming years.

He stated that no special emphasis now is being placed on the movement of immigrants from the United States, but he added that all possible sources of new citizens are being constantly examined.

Several factors are contributing to the dropping off of immigration movements from the United Kingdom and Europe. One of the main reasons is control of the amount of currency which emigrants are allowed to take with them to their new homes.

Second, said the official, is one of the few countries encouraging emigration and "we have a good working arrangement with that country."

Among other large groups were Dutch, 18,491; French, 3,866; Belgian, 3,018; German, 6,053; Estonian, 3,862; Hebrew, 15,047; Italian, 6,928; Lettish, 4,880; Lithuanian, 5,928; Polish, 32,448; Ukrainian, 15,363.

#### Will Consider Excommunication Acts Treason

PRAGUE, July 15 — (AP) — Justice Minister Alexi Cepicka of Czechoslovakia said tonight a treason charge will be lodged against anyone who tries to enforce Pope Pius' decree excommunicating Communists from the Roman Catholic Church.

"Let no one have the slightest doubt that anyone who, in any way, should attempt to carry out this directive of the Vatican perpetrates treason," Cepicka said in a speech.

"All acts violating valid laws will be punished as such. Whoever tries to carry out on our territory the order of the Pope, let him count on the fact that he must forfeit all right to call himself a Czech or Slovak."

Cepicka disclosed plans for a law to stress the Communist Government control of practically all Roman Catholic Church affairs in this country, three-quarters of whose 12,000,000 people are Catholics.

He accused Archbishop Joseph Beran, the Czechoslovak Primate, and other high Church leaders of "reasonable and anti-state activity."

The speech was delivered less than 48 hours after the Vatican made public the papal decree cutting off militant Communists from the sacraments and comforts of the Church.

The Minister declared the excommunication decree was an illegal and hostile act aimed at Soviet Russia and the Communist-led "people's democracies."

"The Vatican organ, L'Osservatore Romano, denied Friday a Communist charge that the Church is meddling in politics through the decree. It said the decree was of an essentially religious nature, which cannot justify an objection whatever."

The Government steps appear to indicate that Communists intend to move uncompromisingly ahead in their campaign to break the power of the Catholic Church here and cut the country's diplomatic ties with the Vatican.

Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia are the only countries in Eastern Europe maintaining full diplomatic contact with the Holy See.

#### News in Brief

LONDON, July 15 — (AP) — Tribesmen of African Basutoland have revived a jurgle ritual of cheating each other up to make "good luck" medicine.

An alarmed British Government is sending Cambridge Professor G. I. Jones there next week to study the problem. He is chief lecturer on native tribes and their ancient customs at the university.

A spokesman for the Commonwealth Relations Office, which is in charge of the primitive area, said there had been nearly 20 such slayings in the last year.

The spokesman gave this explanation: "The Basutos believe they can derive marvelous new powers—spiritual, political or sexual—if they brew a medicine of which the principal ingredient is some portion of a human being they have just killed."

LONDON, July 15 — (Reuters) — An R.A.F. bomber crashed in flames today a quarter of a mile from a bomb dump at Skelling-Thorpe, a village near Lincoln, killing the crew of seven.

##### Recount Confirms Conservative's Election

BRANTFORD, Ont., July 15 — (CP) — A judicial recount of ballots in Brant-Wentworth constituency during the June 27 Federal election today gave John A. Charlton, Progressive Conservative candidate, a 24-vote plurality over his Liberal opponent, James L. Teifer. Mr. Charlton, who represented the riding in the last Parliament, dropped 12 votes in the recount — started when the Liberal, George Cox, C.C.F., gained 20. The final figures were: Charlton, 6,693; Teifer, 6,669; Cox, 2,259.

##### Digby Farmers Turn To Turkey Raising

(By The Canadian Press) METEGHAN, N. S., July 15 — Poultry farmers in this western shore district wiped away perspiration today and predicted a white Christmas—a \$100,000 holiday.

In barnyards scattered throughout Digby County, 8,000 turkeys are fattening for winter dinner tables. It's a new venture for Meteghan farmers—they formerly raised most of Nova Scotia's foxes — started when the bottom fell out of the fox market.

##### Improving Morale

Liberal Harold Harwood and Progressive Conservative Samuel Grant will contest the northern Newfoundland riding in a straight two-party fight.

Newfoundlander selected members for their 25-seat Provincial Legislature today 27 but the election in Labrador was postponed to await better weather.

#### British Scientists Discover Huge Waterfall In Ocean

PLYMOUTH, England, July 15 — (AP) — The world's most stupendous waterfall has just been discovered by a group of British scientists at the bottom of the ocean.

Scientists of the marine biological laboratory have been studying samples of ocean water all around Britain's once-rich fishing grounds. They have been trying to find out why they aren't rich any more, and haven't been since about 1930.

Then they discovered the waterfall. It drops off the continental shelf just west of Britain in the Atlantic Ocean. And it gives the scientists a clue as to why there aren't any fish around those parts any more.

The water is continually dropping off the shelf. But some years the movement is more than others. In an extremely cold winter, such as the one most of Europe had in 1930, the shallow coastal waters be-

came thoroughly chilled and therefore increased in weight. The deeper waters farther away stay about the same the year around.

The heavier cold water, naturally plunges to the bottom in "stupendous quantities," according to Dr. Leslie Cooper, the man who discovered the waterfall.

And in the rush, all the rich food—the worms and minute organisms on which fish feed—is washed out to great depths beyond the 100-fathom mark.

"We believe the fisherman's tragedy of 1930 may have been due to some colossal increase in the waterfall," Dr. Cooper said.

The water that came into the rich fishing grounds was found to be barren of any of the necessary food for fish. It has none of the nutritious salts that make the worms and organisms grow. So the fish starved to death—or went somewhere else.

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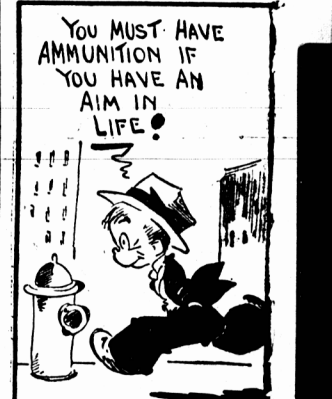
