WHY ARE MOTHERS PARTIAL TO SOME OF THEIR CHILDREN

A Girl Complains Because Her Parent Takes Her Service For Granted

DEAR MISS DIX—What makes mothers play favorites with their children? I am the oldest of four. In New to me are my two brothers, then a young sister. Ever since I was hurried through a business course after finishing high school in order to take a job, I have practically supported the family. I've been the bill-payers while my brothers contributed a five or ten-dollar bill occasionally. Of course my younger sister has done nothing.



My mother has taken all that I do without even so much as a thank-you, but she almost has me of gratitude over my brothers' bringing home bags of potatoes and boasts about what good sons they are, while my younger sister is expected to do nothing but enjoy herself although I was hardworked at her age.

When my brothers wanted to marry mother encouraged them into doing so as she felt they should have their own homes and families; but when I wanted to marry him she broke the affair off by weeping and reminding me of my duty to her. My mother cares less for me than for any of her children although I am the only one who has ever done anything for her. She regards me as only a convenience, but she is proud of them. Why is this?

ANSWER—You must have read in your Bible the story of the prodigal son many times. To me that is the most deeply understanding and profoundly moving picture of the relationship of parents toward their children that has ever been painted. It is just as true of life today as it was thousands of years ago. It is always the prodigals for whom the fatted calf is slain. The good son who does so much as a veal chop. And why this should be so no one can explain. It just is.

LOVE SELFISH ONES BEST Look around you at every family you know. Father and mother always love best the wild harum-scarum children, the selfish ones who take instead of give, the ones who never show their parents any tenderness or affection or consideration; the boys who get into scrapes that they don't care to pay the bill for; the girls who mother their mothers awake at night watching and waiting for to come home and praying God that no ill has befallen them.

I have known dozens of families in which an older daughter, like the writer of this letter, was made the family slave by their mothers. I have known mothers to take the earnings of a frail, delicate daughter and give the money to a big strong, husky, lazy son to spend on fine clothes and wine, women and song. I have heard mothers boast of their daughters who had married and left them and tell about Jane's fine house and Sally's new coat and then sigh and say, poor Martha never had any attraction for men, when she had kept Martha from marrying in order to support the family.

Why this should be the case is a mystery, but several partial explanations may be suggested. One is that some children may be more like their parents in disposition or taste and the nerve to take what it wants; that the wild children may represent the frustrated desire of their parents to do adventurous and daring things that they never had the chance, or the courage to do. The third explanation may be that even parents have the very human inclination we all have to kick a human door mat around.

Perhaps even fathers and mothers respect the child that makes a flight for his own independence and has the nerve to take what it wants, and a corresponding contempt for the one who lets herself be sacrificed on the family altar without so much as a bleat of protest.

ANSWER—They are doing a bit of wishful thinking. They have grown up still believing in Santa Claus. THE COOK'S CORNER

SWEET MIXED PICKLES

2 quarts sliced cucumbers. 1 quart small white onions. 2 heads cauliflower, broken. 2 cups salt. 10 cups water. 2 quarts vinegar. 1 quart water. 3 tablespoons whole mixed pickling spices. 1 cup brown sugar. Method: Use only firm, green cucumbers for this, and ones that are not too large. Wash and slice 1-4-inch slices. Drop small white onions into boiling water for a minute or so. Loosen the skins and then peel them. Cut in halves or leave whole if they are very small. Remove the outer leaves from the cauliflower and cut away part of the stem, then break the curd into small pieces.

Mix these vegetables together and place in a clean crock. Dissolve the salt in the 10 cups of water, then pour this over the prepared vegetables in the crock, and let stand overnight in this brine.

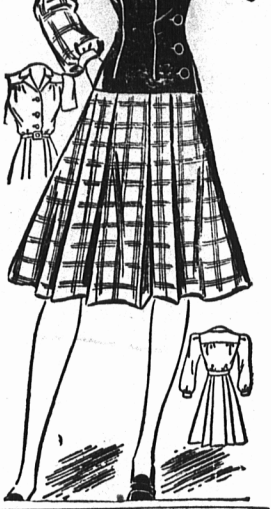
Next day drain the vegetables, then cover with fresh water and drain again. Now combine the vinegar, 1 quart water, the whole pickling spices and the brown sugar. Bring to a boil and boil for 10 minutes, then pour over the drained vegetables which have been replaced in the crock. Allow to stand for 2 days, then drain off the syrup and reheat this to the boiling point. Pack the vegetables into hot, sterilized jars and fill jars to overflowing with the boiling syrup. Seal the jars tightly at once.

BLUEBERRY COBBLER

2 c. fresh or quick-frozen blueberries. 1-4 c. sugar. 1 tbs. cornstarch. 1 1/2 c. corn syrup. 1 tbs. butter or margarine. 3/4 c. water. 2 c. enriched flour. 1 tsp. salt. 1/2 c. baking powder. 2 tbs. sugar. 6 tbs. fat. 3-4 c. milk. Prepare berries, combine sugar and cornstarch and mix with berries. Combine corn syrup and water, pour onto berries, heat to boiling point and cook 5 minutes; turn into greased baking dish, dot with butter or margarine. Sift flour, measure and sift again with baking powder, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Work in fat with pastry blender or tips of fingers; add milk to make soft dough. Drop onto hot berries and bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) until crust is baked and browned. This recipe will serve 6.

FOOTWEAR CARE FOR ECONOMY AND GROOMING

Keeping footwear in good order is not only economy but really good grooming, too. First of all, buy shoes that really fit; they'll retain their shape better. Keep them cleaned and polished—not only for good looks, but because cleaning and polishing helps preserve the leather. Place them on shoe trees as soon as you remove them. Have them repaired as soon as rips appear or heels become crooked. If you've been careless in the rain dry them carefully and



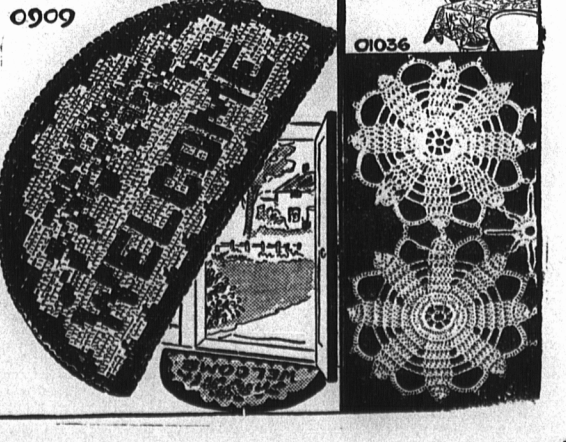
slowly—never close to artificial heat, and polish once or twice as soon as they are dry. Don't try to remove shoes or put them on with unlacing sufficiently. And don't wear the same shoes every day having several pairs and wearing them alternately makes for longer shoe life and greater foot comfort.

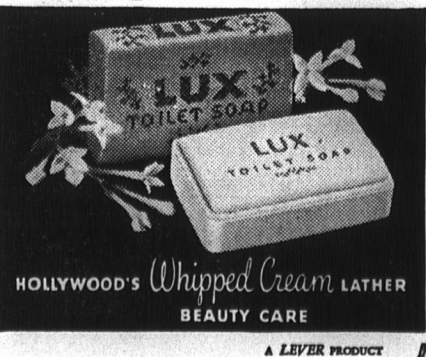
