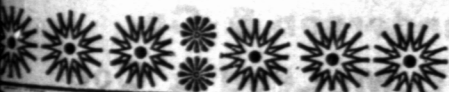

THE Montreal Herald says:—The
Department of Trade and Commerce,
Ottawa, has called for tenders for
steamship services, to begin with the
opening of navigation in the spring. One
of these is for three years' service be-
tween Charlottetown, P. E. I., and
either Boston, Manchester or Liverpool,
Eng.

In the show window of Chas. J.
Mitchell's bookstore is a handsome
Quakerbush new model air gun which
he has imported for the Catholic Liter-
ary Institute of this city. It is 37
inches long and weighs 70 ounces.
The barrel is handsomely nicked and
is held in the frame by a spring guard,
the drawing back of which will allow
the barrel, piston, and spring to be
withdrawn for cleaning. This is the
same gun as is used on the practise
ships of the U. S. navy.

MAJOR PICKERING, provincial officer,
arrived in the city yesterday, from

BURNS' ANNIVERSARY. Opera House,
Jan. 25th.—Robert Burns, the Ayr-
shire bard, so lauded and lionized for a
short period of his stormy and check-
ered career, and comparatively so ne-
glected during his few later years, has
at length risen to an elevation in the
affection of his countrymen, and of the
lovers of song in general, which has no
parallel in the annals of literature. Peer
and Peasant alike, the men of the high-
est culture and the humblest mechanics
and tillers of the soil have enshrined
him in their heart of hearts. The shep-
herd on Australian and New Zealand
plains—the digger in Californian and
Columbian mines—the sailor on the
deck, and the soldier in his barrack—
the Colonist by the banks of the St. Law-
rence and by the shores of the great
American lakes. In short, wherever
men of British birth or descent are
found there are the admirers of the
Scottish poet.
