S.D.U. Students Plan Representation On International Seminar

The students of St. Dunstan's University hope to avail themselves of the opportunity to send one of their number to attend the I. S. S. Seminar to be held in Europe next summer. (This second article on I. S. S. will treat this phase of its work, which is often referred to as "An Experiment in International Living.")

Another seminar, which possibly will be held in Holland, is planned for this summer. St. Dunstan's hopes to be able to send a student to take part in this session. The method employed in selecting Canadian students was found to be very successful. The financial help given them was an important factor in enabling the Committee to select representatives on the basis of their general fitness. Students were chosen on the basis of scholarship and leadership by local university committees. To be eligible, a student must be within one year of graduation, and must fully intend to return to the university in the fall.

NEW IDEAS EXAMINED

The theme of the Seminar was "Recent Trends in Thought," an examination of the new ideas in the field of philosophy, the natural and the social sciences. The seminar gave all the students a new sense of their obligations and of the part they should play in the advancement of knowledge. It helped to overcome the intellectual isolation of the Germans whose intellectual need is greater than the physical. In a world of warring ideologies, the Canadian I. S. S. in the name of the Canadian Universities, has done something concrete to re-educate the German people and to guide European students to the side of freedom and understanding.

The project was financed by the Provincial Governments, which paid the transportation costs for the Canadian students; the Canadian Council for Reconstruction

through U. N. E. S. C. O., which made a grant of \$16,500 to finance the seminar in Germany; and the Educational Branch of the British Control Commission in Germany, which procured the use of the famous seventeenth-century Castle of Schloss Pion and furnished it, and also provided transportation from Holland.

Another seminar, which possibly will be held in Holland, is planned for this summer. St. Dunstan's hopes to be able to send a student to take part in this session. FEDERATION MEETINGS

All day Thursday, starting at 9.30, will be given over to the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture. The Board of Directors of this body is made up of representatives from the following organizations: the Dairyman; Women's Institute; Swine and Sheep Breeders; Poultry Council; Potato Growers; Co-operative Union; Credit Union League; Central Farmers' Institutes; Milk Producers' and Vendors; Fox Breeders and two directors-at-large from each county.

Mr. R. A. Proffitt, president of the Federation, points out that the work of the organization has grown considerably and is done on a voluntary basis. He feels that the present form of the Federation should be extended to include direct contact with the rural districts with some form of stable financing. He outlined two proposals to accomplish this, the first being the establishment of two Regional Groups per County. The second proposal follows the practice in Nova Scotia, which calls for a system of Regional Groups made up of five or six school districts. These would form a county Federation which, in turn would appoint their representatives to the provincial board of the Federation.

C.P. Review Of Coming Session

(Canadian Press)

Prince Edward Island's 22nd legislature will open here Tuesday. Liberal Premier J. Walter Jones has predicted the session will produce mostly amendments to present legislation. Included are modification of the Labor Act and slight revisions of the Education and Temperance Acts.

Premier Jones said today he did not think the Throne Speech would include any legislation of a "stirring or contentious nature" to the six-man Conservative opposition in the 30-seat House.

But the Government is expected to introduce a Workmen's Compensation Bill and a measure lifting the ban on sale and manufacture of margarine in the province - with certain limitations. Sale and manufacture of the butter substitute was banned last month under an act passed in 1938 by another Liberal government. According to its provisions, the act could be enforced upon request of four members of the P.E.I. Dairyman's Association.

Legality of the act has been referred to the province's Supreme Court for a ruling in light of the previous one handed down by the Supreme Court of Canada on the margarine question. There has been no indication when Chief Justice Thane Campbell will announce the court's decision.

Premier Jones said his party as yet had held no caucus and probably would not until the Throne Speech had been read.

Leading the 24-man Liberal administration for the sixth session since he entered the house in 1935, 70-year-old farmer-premier said his government was better prepared and organized for this session than ever before. He holds the education and industry portfolios and is acting provincial secretary-treasurer.

Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, former premier whose government was defeated in 1935, leads the Opposition. It will be the 67-year-old physician's 24th year as a member of the legislature.

Reversal of a change in the Trade Union Act, which prohibits Island unions from affiliating with national organizations, have been prevalent here for some time. The act has been under fire from Canadian labor leaders and P.E.I. farmers have gone on record opposing the legislation.

P.E.I. Teachers Executive Meeting

The executive of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation met in their office on Friday evening, February 16 with all members present. Reporting on federal aid, the general secretary stated that copies of "The School Needs Adequate Finances," viz. Women's Institutes, Farmers' Study Clubs, and the Legion. Various groups have already reported favourably on this project. A report from the Central Teachers' office in Ottawa was also given, showing that the delegation which recently met with the Federal Government were given a very courteous and understanding reception in connection with the Teachers' request for federal aid for education. An active future policy has also been adopted by the G.T.F.

Various teachers' organizations across the Dominion, the G.T.F. and the C.E.A. are assisting in a feature article in a well-circulated magazine. This article will deal with the teacher situation in our country. Miss Vera Simpson, as chairman of the Easter program committee, made a report on the work of her committee. Final arrangements were made for convention. The Curriculum Committee early in March will meet with the Department of Education for a discussion of textbook and curricular problems. Mr. C.R. MacLean reported on

Miss Estelle Bowness of Summerside, chairman of the Federation Educational Publicity Campaign Committee, will take charge of the necessary preparations. The next meeting will be that of the Board of Governors at the Easter convention.
