St. Dunstan's Score 5-2 Victory Over Vics In Intermediate League

Coming up with a powerful second period scoring spree, A. J. MacAdam's Saint Dunstan's University pucksters skated their way to a 5-2 victory over Had Meinnis's Victorias in an Island Intermediate Hockey League fixture at the Forum last night.

The victory for Saints broke up a tie with Summerside Crystals for third place in the standing to give the Saints sole possession of that spot within two points of the second place Vics.

With the exception of the middle canto when the Saints were really hot to outscore the Vics 5-1, the game was a very close affair with both teams skating fast and coming up with some smart breaking attacks that saw them battle it out to a scoreless first period and the Vics outscore their opponents 1-0 in the third canto.

Frankie Strain, playing a head-up game in the Saints' nets, made his closest bid to date for his first shutout of the season and came up with some stellar saves, particularly in the first period when the Vics swarmed all around his net in an effort to cut down the score. A slap shot by Plum MacDonald from close in on goal in the second period, and a smart breakaway by Bobby Dowling in the closing session were the only two that got past him.

Right from the opening song, both teams jumped to the attack to come up with some fast and furious scoring attacks that came within inches of scoring, and despite the fact that the pace kept up all through the frame, both goalies Strain and Ward came up with some nice work to keep the teams scoreless.

Clicking on smart passing attacks in the sandwich session was the deciding factor for the Saints. Teaming up with Mahar and Bernard Deighen broke through for the first tally at 2:35 of the second period, with McIsaac and Rodgers roaring back three minutes later to notch up another. McIsaac potted the goal with a hard shot from about 30 feet out on a pass from Rodgers.

The Vics retaliated at 7:27 when MacDonald banged one home at the end of a Vics pressure attack for their first tally of the game, but the Saints, who definitely outskated their opponents in the frame, returned to score again a little over a minute later. Deighen scored the goal, his second of the night, on another smooth passing attack with teammates Mahar and Bernard.

Not content with their 3-1 margin, the Saints continued the pressure, and before the period was over had slapped in two more past a harassed Ward. Farmer got

the fourth on another good play with Rodgers, while Houde sniped the other on a passing attack with DesRosiers at 18:55 to give them a four goal lead.

Coming back with renewed effort after their second-period setback, the Vics applied most of the pressure through the final period, and at times practically camped inside the Saints' blue-line to fire rubber at Strain. But the Saints net custodian was hot and held the Vics at bay, with some strong assistance from the Saints defence, until Bobby Dowling made a smart solo effort in the closing minutes of the game. Working hard all night, Dowling poked the puck away from Joe Mahar at centre ice to stickhandle his way through the Saints' defence and beat Strain cleanly with a hard, driving shot. It was the final goal of the night and although the Vics continued to press the attack, Strain was on the job to keep them off until the final whistle.



Maxim Wins World Light-Heavyweight Title From Mills

 LONDON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Handsome Joey Maxim of Cleveland took back the world's light-heavyweight championship to the United States tonight by knocking out titleholder Freddie Mills of Britain in the 10th round at Earl's Court Arena.

A record British indoor crowd of 18,000 gave the American boxer a tremendous ovation as he danced joyfully around the ring after his spectacular victory in 1:54 of the 10th frame. The bout was scheduled for 15 rounds.

It was Mills' first defence of the crown he lifted from Gus Leschivich of Clifton, N. J., in London July 26, 1948. Since then, the stocky, bootlegger Briton had fought only twice and he showed the lack of ring activity tonight.

Except for a furious first-round attack by Mills, it was all Maxim. Joey piled up a big lead and was ahead six rounds to two with two even on the Associated Press scorecard going into what proved to be the final stanza.

In the 10th, Maxim set up the champion with a stiff left jab to the face and then crossed a terrific right to Mills' jaw. The champion sagged to the floor. He was on his knees as the timekeeper tolled the count. At the count of eight, Mills tumbled on his side. He was brought to his corner by his handlers but recovered quickly.

Maxim, who weighed 174 1/4 to Mills' 173, was a favorite to win but his knockout finale was unexpected.

Bookmakers here had established the 27-year-old invader as a 1-to-2 favorite on the strength of his ring cunning. The 30-year-old champion was rated the heavier puncher and if any knocking-out was to be done, Mills was the one expected to do the job.

Playing in a second-round game for the grand aggregate, skip Sutton stole the show when he threw his second rock right inside the six-foot circle of a Quebec Winter Club sheet. The "eight rock play" came in the second end. Wolville went on to win the game 13-8.
