

Detailed Reports Presented At C.W.L. Meeting

Activities Of National And Diocesan Conventions Reviewed By Miss Dorsey.

The regular monthly meeting of the C. W. L. was held Wednesday night in the K. of C. Hall with the president, Miss Dorsey, in the chair.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. J. P. McCloskey, read a letter from Mrs. J. J. Trainor, First Vice President, with her resignation from that office owing to her removal from the city.

A special committee reported having arranged definitely with the Knights of Columbus in regard to the use of K. of C. Hall for the year's activities.

The St. Zita Club for domestic workers is to be reorganized and Fall work was planned for the subdivision, the first affair to be a pantry sale Oct. 21st.

Miss Dorsey, President, as delegate to the National Convention in Quebec last June and to the Charlottetown Division Convention, read the reports following.

Roll call is to be in force at each meeting hereafter and a record of attendance placed on file.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT—DIOCESE OF CHARLOTTETOWN

The Convention opened for business at the Knights of Columbus Hall, July 13th at 1.30 p.m.

The Convention was called to order by the President, Mrs. Catherine Creamer of Kelly's Cross, who opened the meeting with the League prayer.

Roll call showed a large number of sub-divisions represented. The correspondence was then read and the Convention Committees appointed.

Corresponding Secretary—Mrs. M. M. Murphy, Letters of courtesy following convention, notice to members on their election to office and members on being appointed to committees, copies of by-laws to each sub-division being sent.

Treasurer—Mrs. Farnell McMahon, Summerside reported: The National obligation, including Per Capita, Sisters of Service, Scholarship and Budget had been fulfilled by the sub-divisions with few exceptions.

Organization—Mrs. McGrath for Prince County, reported one new sub-division, Mrs. W. J. McIntyre, Charlottetown, for Queen's, two new sub-divisions, Mrs. F. J. Casey, King's County, reported two in King's and one in Queen's, all new divisions doing good work.

Right Reverend Monsignor McDonald congratulated Mrs. McIntyre on receipt of the honor. Right Reverend Father McLellan also offered his congratulations and paid tribute to the Catholic Women's League.

Mrs. Catherine Creamer, Diocesan President, congratulated Mrs. McIntyre and read telegrams of congratulation from the National President, Mrs. J. C. Keenan and Montreal Sub-division.

On behalf of the Catholic Women's League and Junior Catholic Women's League Mrs. McIntyre was presented with beautiful flowers. Reverend Dr. Campbell of Alberton, the speaker of the evening, on opening his address congratulated Mrs. McIntyre.

Reverend Father Enright and Reverend Father Flemming of the Holy Redeemer Parish extended congratulations.

The Corpus Christi Choir rendered very acceptable music, also Mr. Alfred McKearney. Mrs. Creamer read the National Convention report.

Many friends of Mrs. McIntyre then came forward and offered to her their congratulations. Saturday morning the delegates attended the Convention Mass at the Basilica at 7.30 a.m.

REPORT OF 13TH NATIONAL CONVENTION, QUEBEC CITY

The opening session of the 13th Annual Convention, at the Chateau Frontenac, on June the 12th, was a call to all Catholic Women to sustain, through their individual and united example and influence, the principles of the Catholic Church, with special reference to its doctrines with regard to divorce and to birth control.

Mrs. W. J. McIntyre's address was a clarion call to arms in the same cause, and similar sentiments were voiced by the Right Reverend John T. Kidd, Bishop of London, Ontario.

Distinguished by attendance of His Eminence, the Cardinal Archbishop of Quebec, and other eminent clerics, representatives of the provincial and municipal governments, the opening of the convention in the assembly hall was an impressive occasion.

His Eminence, wearing his princely red, was met at the entrance of the hotel by the National and Diocesan Catholic Women's League officers, and on his way to the meeting hall passed through a Guard of Honor of two lines of Girl Guides from the Quebec Catholic Women's League Companies.

With His Eminence were the Right Reverend Bishop Kidd of London, the Right Reverend Francis Janssens, Abbot General of the Cistercians of Rome, the Reverend P. Casgrain, C. M. G., in his for-

ence for his interest and approbation of the Catholic Women's League and his presence at the convention opening, and voiced to him, on behalf of the Catholic Women's League a wholehearted fealty. Referring to the past year, she was proud to know that through service and self-sacrifice the Catholic Women's League had lent assistance in response to every appeal not only locally, but to relieve distress in stricken districts throughout Canada.

On Tuesday Pontifical Mass was offered in the Basilica, and at 9.30 the business session opened with the unfurling of the Union Jack and Papal flag. The President then recited the League prayer and welcomed the visitors to the 13th Annual Convention.

The Executive Secretary, Miss Margaret Jones, read her report, which was followed by those of National Conventions. Organization, reported forty new sub-divisions, five hundred branches, membership 30,000. The Immigration and Traveler's Aid reported girls were met at port of entry, taken care of in the Hotels, employment secured for them, a decrease in amount of work in this aiding travellers.

Child welfare report showed much good work, such as help to mothers, clothing of infants, finding homes for children and co-operation with children-aids. Owing to economical conditions, the convener of Social Service reported much work done in providing for poor families, finding clothing and procuring medicine for the sick, school children were provided with books and in many other ways the needy were helped.

The Convener of Juniors reported a membership of 1,700, she raised ten thousand during the year apart from their social activities, study clubs and teaching of catechism.

Girl Guides reported a membership of 41,882, their object—the promotion of good citizenship. At a luncheon given in the Chateau Frontenac, the speakers were Mrs. Charles Fremont, Canon Casgrain, the Right Reverend Bishop Kidd. After the luncheon the business session was resumed.

Much discussion as to whether or not to change condition for qualification ensued. At the evening session Mrs. McIntyre presided. The speakers were Reverend Dr. Hugh Somers, Director of the School for Catechists at St. Francis, Miss Beatrice Bray of Ottawa, National Convener of Juniors, and the Reverend Father Joseph Fallon, S. J., President of Catholic Truth Society. The Business Women's Sub-division entertained the visiting business women and juniors at dinner at Kent House, Montmorency Falls.

At the evening session Miss Lynch of New York and Dr. Delaney and Brother Arnold of the Christian Brothers spoke. The third day the delegates attended Mass in the old Church of Our Lady of Victory. Reverend Gavan Monaghan was the celebrant. On resuming business the diocesan reports were read. The President, Mrs. McIntyre, then gave an account of her organizing tour in the West.

On Thursday night a large number of delegates and members attended the banquet held in the ball room of the Chateau Frontenac.

His Eminence Cardinal Villeneuve sent his regrets for his absence, through the Most Reverend J. C. McGuigan, Archbishop of Regina, who gave an address. In the course of his remarks he said that he had been charged by His Eminence the Cardinal to announce the gracious news, that His Holiness the Pope had honored Mrs. W. J. McIntyre, National President of the Catholic Women's League, with the decoration "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" in recognition of her service to church and social welfare.

In reply Mrs. McIntyre said she accepted it as a token of respect to her sister members of the League. It was with pride and joy the delegates received the news that

Sportsmen Are Gathering For Shooting Season

(Special to the Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 4.—Concurrent with the opening of the big game hunting season in New Brunswick on Monday reports from guides would indicate that there is a great abundance of deer, according to the Fish and Game Department of the Canadian National Railways.

Already a number of non-resident sportsmen are in the woods and some kills have been reported. Prominent among the non-resident sportsmen who have arrived to hunt deer are W. W. Smith of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., well known sportsman and member of the Cough Drop Manufacturing concern. With Mrs. Smith, Charles F. Adams, owner of the Boscun Bruins Hockey Club, and Charles H. Hemway also of Boston, Mass.

The moose season does not open until October 20th. Fair bags of waterfowl have been obtained by sportsmen but birds have not begun to gather in the Bale De Chalcur district or among the islands of the lower Rest gouches. Woodcock and partridge are reported quite plentiful. The Woodcock season opened October 1 but the partridge season will not be on until October 15, closing October 31.

In Nova Scotia there would appear to be an abundance of deer and considerable moose. The season for moose and deer opens on October 10 and ends October 31. No moose shooting is permitted on Cape Breton Island. Ducks are more plentiful than for some years past. The season for duck is now in full swing in all parts of Nova Scotia and a banner season is looked for. The season for geese and brant opened in Nova Scotia except in Shelburne and Queens Counties on October 1. In the two latter counties it opens November 1.

Woodcock have been noted in great numbers and sportsmen should have no difficulty in bagging the legal limit which is eight per day and not more than 125 in the season. The season opened October 1.

Prince Edward Island also reports good flocks of ducks, geese and brant with good woodcock shooting, the season for ducks, geese and brant opened September 1 and for woodcock September 15.

WORLD PRODUCTION OF COPPER

World production of refined copper in June amounted to 85,500 tons and in July to 91,700 tons; deliveries during the two months were 111,000 tons and 110,800 tons, respectively. World stocks of refined copper were estimated at 673,250 tons on July 31, a 5.3 per cent decline from the tonnage on hand on June 30th.
