WORKING AND PLAYING.

Of course, everybody admits that everybody who really works ought to have a holiday. Why is it that often we make such a tremendous task of spending our leisure time? Perhaps it is that there is some secret of living that we have not learned. If we live our working life in feverishness and haste and anxiety, the chances are that we will take our play and leisure and rest in something of the same spirit. But there is much of the same spirit. Feverishness of our working life that we could very well do without—if only we had learned how. And if we had learned how our work would be

done very much better, and the necessity for the change and rest and holiday that we are now so insistent upon would not be nearly so manifest. The purpose of our life has been altogether too much that we might learn how to live a living, rather than that we should really learn to live. Some of us have mastered the first accomplishment altogether too well, but we have at the same time made very little achievement in the latter. To live worthily both in the midst of work and of leisure is an ideal and a most difficult accomplishment. If we have learned it, the chances are that we will not find either work or play a task burdensome and heavy to bear. Both will be easy and natural.

POLICE SCARES JUDICIARY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5—Police Commissioner Rhinelander Waldo, last night gave out his formal statement relative to the Rosenthal case. The Commissioner recommended an impartial and thorough investigation of the charges made relative to the alleged connection between the Police and the gamblers. At the same time he aimed a blow straight from the shoulder at Judiciary, declaring that gambling can exist only because gamblers can obtain what amounts to protection from the Courts, and asserting that gamblers do much of corrupt the election work of the political parties who place Judiciary on the bench.

ST. JOHN WILL WITNESS BOMBARDMENT.

Warfare at Tripoli to be Shown at Greater St. John Exhibition.
The last word in pyrotechnic drama will be witnessed, free of charge by the thousands who attend the Greater St. John Exhibition, to be held from August 31st to September 7th. This is to be "The Bombardment of Tripoli," as produced by the T. W. Hand Co., famous fireworks firm, Hamilton, Ont. The bombardment is a marvellous spectacle, over 100 feet in length, representing the commencement of hostilities between the Turks and Italians, on the African coast. Before us lie the seawall and the forts of Tripoli, with the Italian fleet coming into sight. A warning shot resounds from the forts, but the Italians continue into action. Shells begin to fly, the engagement grows hotter and more stubborn. The air is filled with bursting shells, war rockets are sent up; lyddite explodes with terrific detonations. Finally magazines in the forts ignite and explode with appalling effect. In very truth a big warlike engagement is imitated, and in the magnificent finale in which all the materials of modern warfare are represented, the variety and lavishness of the fire spectacle looks on spellbound by the display.

This is only one of the special fireworks features at the big show. Among others are the Son of the Golden West; The Performing Bear; Fairy Screen; Whirling Orbs of Gold; Prince of Wales' Feather, a patriotic device; The Rose, Thistle and Shamrock; the Enchanted Garden; the Screen of Molten Silver, etc. Together there are fifty-three separate and distinct items on the mighty fireworks programme, introducing every novelty in the fiery art, and eclipsing all previous attempts made by the St. John Exhibition Association in making this feature an unqualified success.

The fireworks display will be only one of numerous other features. The others are the Aeroplans flights twice daily by M. Emil Metach, of France, in his Morok monoplane; Signor Jovine's famous band of Neapolitan Troubadours, a party of twenty men and women who sing, play and dance in true Italian fashion; the ludicrous Ernest Trio of German knockabout acrobats; Takezawa's Japanese troupe of jugglers, balancers, acrobats and wonder-workers in general; to say nothing of animal acts, two vaudeville theatres, the big Pike, Midway, the Coney Island novelties and continuous band concerts, etc.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. An application must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to cash homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$20 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.

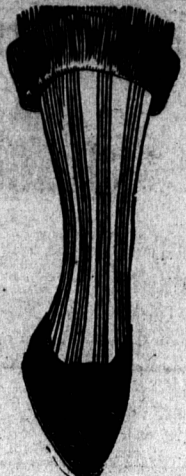
