POPE'S CHAMBERLAIN DIES

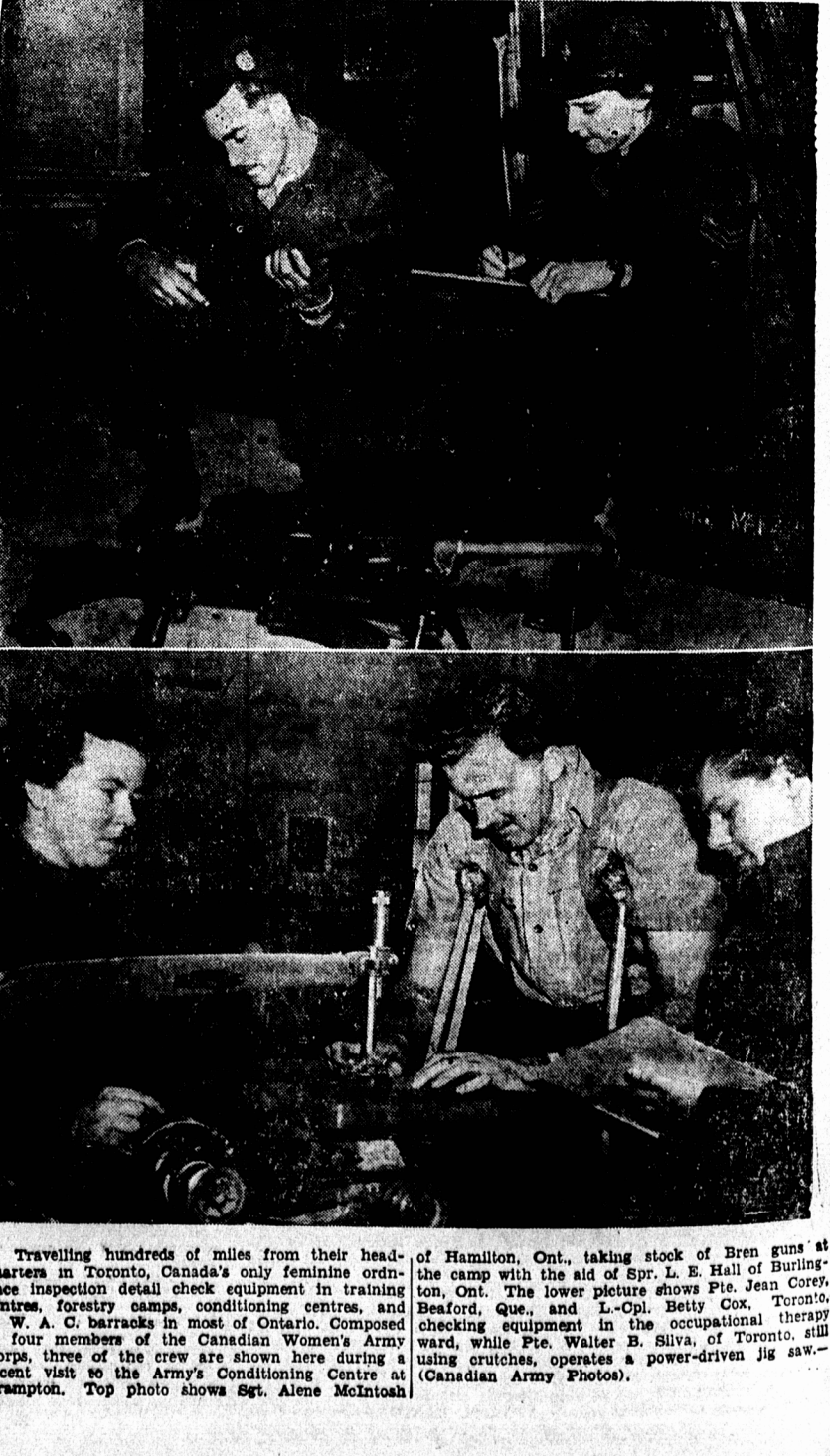
