A MATTER OF ECONOMY.

If the thousand and one things about the house that make money go fast—the little things that don't seem to count—were bunched together in one, it would not be so difficult to stop the leak. But they are usually such trivial things that it takes more than a sharp and ever-watchful eye to keep the expenses down.

THE SWEAT SHOPS OF LONDON, ENG.

Rev. Father Bernard Vaughan's Illustration of Poor Worker's Trouble

LONDON, February 19.—Father Bernard Vaughan, a brother of the late Cardinal Vaughan, preaching in the Jesuit church here yesterday, during the course of a powerful plea in behalf of the bill which will come before the House of Commons this week against "sweat-shops," gave a graphic illustration of the manner in which the poor workers in the east end of London are compelled to live.

In a small room he said, that ought to be occupied by no more than two persons, there were twelve machines working all day and late in the evening. Then the machines were removed and straw mattresses laid on the floor, men being admitted to sleep.

At 2.30 in the morning these men were turned into the street and the room let to another set of sleepers who were also driven out at 6.30 a.m. on the return of the machine workers.

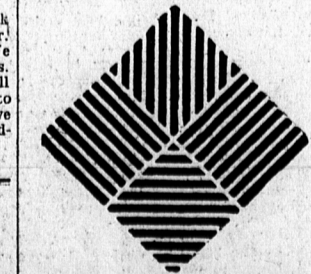

ENFORCEMENTS OF LORD'S DAY ACT

Alliance Claim Police Tried to
Render The Law Ridiculous

WINNIPEG, February 19.—The Lord's Alliance today disavowed responsibility for the house-to-house crusade to enforce the Sabbath Day act, and the police commissioners decided not to attempt any further petty prosecutions. This decision was the climax of an action which brought six hundred persons into the police court last week and stirred the whole city to resentment. The Lord's Day Alliance claim the police were unnecessarily severe in order to render the law ridiculous in Winnipeg.



Test for Astigmatism

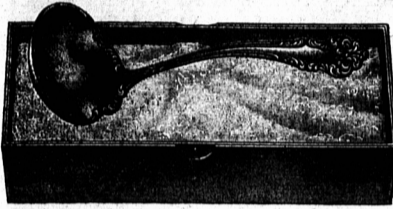
