ST. JOSEPH, N. B., March 11—(Wednesday) — (CP) — Mon-ton Wheeler's became New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island junior hockey champions early today with a total score of 17-10 for a two-game series with Charlottetown Royals. Wheeler's took the deciding game 7-5 after gaining a 10-5 lead in the second quarter last week.

Moncton next will play Nova Scotia for the Maritime title.

### Harold Fair Enroute Home

NEW YORK, March 9—(CP)—Harold Fair, member of The Canadian Press for 21-2 years, reached New York today on route to Canada.

"Never saw so many lights in my life as New York flashed at us when our ship got into the harbor late last night," said Fair facetiously. "After the blackout was a sight, but we couldn't disembark until today."

Fair, a native of Arthur, Ont., was one of the staff of eight Canadians manning the C. P. Bureau in London who have reported to their countrymen the momentous events in Empire history since the war's start.

A graduate of the University of Toronto, Fair was prepared for his duties in London by experience gained in reporting for the C. P. Bureau in Ontario, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island Legislatures and as a member of the parliamentary press gallery in Ottawa.

He joined C. P. staff after his graduation in 1934 and worked in the Toronto, Ottawa, New York, Montreal and Halifax bureaux before he crossed the Atlantic a week after war broke out to join the London staff.

Reports from the Japanese government last month placed the number of prisoners taken at Hong Kong at 10,947 of whom 1,689 were Canadians.

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### Sylvanus Apps Awarded Byng Trophy By Writers

MONTREAL, March 10—(CP)—A new honor was bestowed on Sylvanus Apps tonight when the great centre ice star of Toronto Maple Leafs was named as the winner of the Byng Trophy, awarded annually to the player in the National Hockey League adjudged to combine the best type of sportsmanship with a high standard of playing ability.

Announcement that Apps had won the coveted individual trophy was made by Frank Calder, President of the N.H.L. Eleven hockey writers in the six N. H. L. cities took part in balloting conducted by the league, with Apps winning in a walk. Second place went to Gordie Drillon, also of the Leafs, while Bill Thoms of Chicago's Black Hawks was third.

Each hockey writer named 10 choices, with 10 points being allotted for a first place vote, nine for a second, and so on down the line. On that basis Apps compiled 100 points from eight first, two seconds, and one ninth. Drillon, who received one first place vote, had 66 points while Thoms, who got two votes for first, had 61.

In naming Apps as the winner of the award, the writers took into consideration the fact that the Leaf centre has yet to incur his first penalty this season. And he is tied with Drillon as Toronto's leading point-maker. Apps has 18 goals and 22 assists for 40 points, while Drillon has 23 goals and has helped in 17 others.

In all, 31 players were mentioned in the balloting with little Bobby Bauer, the Boston Bruins star, who won the award in the last two seasons and who now is in the Royal Canadian Air Force, drawing only an eighth place vote for three points.

### Boston Bruins Overwhelm Chihawks 9-1

BOSTON, March 10—(AP)—The defending champion Boston Bruins assured themselves of at least third place in the current National Hockey League campaign by overwhelming Chicago Black Hawks 9-1 tonight before a skiptry 8,600 crowd at the Boston Garden.

This one-sided contest, considered a preview of the circuit's "B" series playoffs, became a rout in the second period when the Bruins put on a three-goal spurge to break a 1-1 deadlock. They then lashed five pucks through the harassed Sam Lo Presti during the finale.

The Black Hawks performing without big Earl Selbert, their star defenceman, scored after 74 seconds of play when rookie Bill Mosienko batted in a long pass from Bob Carse. Gordie Bruce put the Bruins into a tie about five minutes later.

While the Bruins were sharp shooting at Lo Presti during the last two periods, both Flash Hollett and Roy Conacher scored twice against him. The other Boston tallies were off the sticks of Des Smith, Jack Shewchuk, Jack McGill and Herb Cain. The latter was greatly excited about his feat, for it represented his 100th goal of his nine-year N.H.L. career.

### Short Course Is Completed

The fifth Egg and Poultry grading Short Course held under the Dominion-Provincial Youth Training Scheme ended recently at the Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown. Twenty students were enrolled in all completing the month's course.

These courses provide preliminary training for graders needed in Registered Egg Grading Stations in P.E.I. and fifteen students from this year's class have already been assured of work in these stations, which there are forty-seven throughout the Province.

This year's class was featured by an increase in the number of girls taking the course. There were 9 girls and 11 boys. Army enlistments of young men has made it necessary to draw the work over to girls and they are proving themselves to be especially apt to this work.

In addition to being trained in the grading of eggs and poultry a foundation knowledge is provided in all matters pertaining to farm production, management and marketing.

These courses are under the supervision of Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. Mr. A. F. Darnell of Dominion Poultry Services and his assistants were in charge of instruction. Officers who assisted with lectures were: Messrs. B. F. Finney, Experimental Station, Charlottetown; A. A. Dickson, Experimental Station, Charlottetown; Dr. Ross Thompson, Health of Animals Division, Charlottetown; S. C. Wright, Provincial Department of Agriculture.
