Latest News of the City and Province.

W. W. STETSON, state superintendent of schools, passed through Binger on Monday on his way to Augusta from Charlottetown, P. E. I., where he delivered several addresses before large gatherings of provincial teachers. Mr. Stetson was highly pleased with the reception accorded him and spoke in flattering terms of his entertainment.—Commercial.

ATTENTION is called to extension of date in the Grand Provincial Bazaar and tickets are good to return up to and on Friday Oct. 20. Thursday Oct. 19 was the former date, as this will be the last reduced fares to Charlottetown this season. Every body should take advantage of same, as this time limit of tickets has being extended, it gives the public a grand opportunity to do their usual fall business.

THERE was a big gathering of Sir Knights at last night's meeting of the Encampment of St. John Knights Templar. After the work of the evening had been performed the company adjourned to the banquet hall, where an excellent supper had been prepared. The Noble and Eminent Commander, Geo. Blake, presided, and a very pleasant evening was spent. The meal over with the following toasts were honored: The Queen, the Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada, to which Most Eminent Supreme Grand Master J. V. Bro's real agency in this city is now in full working order, with F. H. McKel at the helm. Offices were opened Sept. 1st, in the Jarvis building, 74 Prince William street. This is the agency for New Brunswick and P. E. Island. Mr. McKel has two assistants, and will shortly add a permanent reporter. The work of revising for the three lower provinces is being carried out by two experienced men from Montreal. One has been for three months in Nova Scotia and the other has just finished in P. E. Island. He is now in this province, and will be joined in a month or so by the other and they will complete the work together. All reports for N. B. and P. E. I. will be transferred from the Halifax office to St. John, and a sheet for these two provinces will also be published here. It will be larger than the present Halifax one, and will be further enlarged and improved later. The chief clerk from Montreal was here with Mr. McKel for three weeks, and the superintendent, John A. Fulton, for nearly two weeks. The St. John office is fully equipped, and Mr. McKel is kept very busy attending to the enquiries pouring in to this agency from all parts of Canada and the United States. The agency is in good hands and has started under very favorable auspices.—St. John Sun.

At the meeting of the Cheese Board yesterday eight factories boarded 1715 cheese; 114 bid, no sales. Next meeting of the board on Friday, Oct. 27, at 11.30. This will probably be the last meeting of the Board for the season.

COMPLAINTS were made at the meeting yesterday that some of the factories are not keeping their curing rooms at a proper temperature, resulting in a pasty cheese with a bitter flavor. The proper temperature for the curing room for October cheese is 60 to 64 degrees.
