MCKENNA TO FIGHT HERE

It is understood from good authority that Jack McKenna is to be matched to fight a good middleweight in this city during Exhibition week.

The fans have been clamoring for another bout here with McKenna as one of the principals and pitted against another good fighter. If present plans materialize, Prince Edward Island will be the site and these attending will have an opportunity of witnessing in action one of the best middleweights in the game stacked up against an equally stiff opponent.

McKenna boxes in Chicago next Monday night after which he will leave for the Maritimes. He will be accompanied by his manager, the famous Eddie Mead and Mrs. Mead. Stevie McDonald also plans on making the trip.

Mead informs the writer that McKenna is now being slowly groomed to meet Ace Hudkins or Rene Devois claimants for Mickey Walker's crown. As both men are well over the 160 pound limit they will necessarily have to weigh in at the right weight before the fight.

This is good news coming from McKenna's camp, and judging by his long list of decisions and knockouts, it looks as if the bold Jack has a great chance of getting a slant at Walker's title before the Spring of 1929.

GEORGETOWN RACES SPLENDID DESPITE POOR CONDITIONS

Fred Medium, Major Aubrey And Orola Were The Winners.

The Georgetown horse races were good heat finishing close to Fred Medium, Edgerton third, Marge Direct who had made a couple of breaks fourth. Evelyn Patch was distanced in the first heat.

2.25 Trot and Pace. Major Aubrey who was defeated at St. Peters by Bingen Aubrey, turned the tables on him yesterday winning very decisively in three straight heats. Bingen Aubrey a comfortable second. Aubrianna third. Eastern Lady a slow class trotter started with the pacers and showed considerable speed. She was drawn in the third heat.

2.35 Trot and Pace. This race went to five heats before a decision was arrived at, being finally won by Orola, owned by J. M. Carney of Sturgeon. Dixie Marque took the first two heats comparatively easy but in the third made a break and lost so much ground that she was not a factor and could only finish third. Orola, a speedy free-legged pacer won the third heat after a great battle with Louise Colorado, formerly owned by George Hooper of Charlottetown, now owned by Joe McGregor of Montague. Louise Colorado is a much improved pacer and in the fourth heat, well driven by Willard Kelly, looked like the winner until she was rushed and gained the decision. The two heat winners Dixie Marque and Orola then went out to settle who was to have the winner's share of the money. Dixie Marque trailed Orola until the last eighth when she took on a rush of speed and passed Orola, Orola making a break and apparently out of it. She recovered quickly, however, and came on very fast, beating Dixie Marque by a neck in one of the most exciting races of the day. The Banker, a trotter owned by Pratt and Sons, St. Peters, put up a real good race, many remarking on the improvement over St. Peters.

HEENEY THE CHALLENGER, HAS RECORD THAT ENTITLES HIM TO BE CONSIDERED A WORTHY OPPONENT OF GENE TUNNEY

Eight years in the ring gives Tom Heeneey the proud privilege of fighting for the heavyweight championship of the world—eight long years, in which he has fought his way from the blacksmith's forge to the peak of the boxing game. Twenty-nine years ago Heeneey was born in New Zealand, and outside of Les Darcy is the first Antipodean to carry his country's colors into a championship match.

Heeneey is one of the most colorful fighters who has ever graced the ring. He lost two bouts in 32 and has 10 knockouts to his credit. Born on May 19, 1899, from his youth he was always inclined to the boxing game. His idol was John L. Sullivan, and he patterned himself along the lines of that wonderful fighter, whose name will go down in history as one of the greatest exponents of the game.

Heeneey during his meteoric career has only been in six bouts in which he was not given the decision. He lost two and drew four. Tom is the white hope of the British Empire, and millions throughout the British dominions will eagerly await the result of his battle with Tunney. Heeneey, the plodder, will carry the Union Jack against the Stars and Stripes as represented by Gene Tunney.

Gene Tunney, the scholarly, highly-polished master of boxing finesse, will undertake to overcome the endurance, strength and dogged determination of the rock-ribbed, iron-jawed New Zealander. This meeting, which means considerable to Tunney as it does to Heeneey, epitomizes the last word in heavyweight efficiency. With its attendant ballyhoos it promises to be the greatest heavyweight bout in modern history.

The mantle of ring monarch handed down to Jim through the thirty-six years of its career from Sullivan to Corbett, to Fitzsimmons, to Jeffries, to Johnson, to Willard and then to Dempsey, will be placed at stake in the ring of the Yankee Stadium Thursday night by Gene Tunney when he faces Tom Heeneey in a bout scheduled for 15 rounds.

\$100,000 Goes To Heeneey

Heeneey is signed for the challenger's customary 12 1-2 per cent, by dictate of the New York State commission, but is assured of a minimum of \$100,000, quite a sizable sum. The rugged New Zealander came seventeen months ago unheralded and unsung, as just another bit of boxing driftwood from the old world, and with only a few-fetched dreams such as come to every boxer, that he would one day be fighting for the ring's richest prize. Win or lose, Heeneey will have no cause for complaint. The fates, or whatever it is that directs pugilistic affairs these days, have not only been kind. They have been generous.

Tex Rickard has had 88,000 tickets printed for the battle, and has scaled his prices of admission from \$5 to \$40, including the federal tax of 25 per cent and the state tax of 5 per cent. Every seat

reserved even to the bleacher sections. If the entire supply of tickets is sold, the gate receipts will reach a total of \$2,400,000. Arrangements have been made for Tunney and Heeneey to weigh in Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Madison Square Garden. The champion intends to fly to New York Thursday morning from his training camp at Speculator. Heeneey will motor from his quarters at Fairhaven, situated between Red Bank and Rumson, N. J.

Tunney is assured of at least \$25,000 for defending the title he won two years ago from Jack Dempsey in the rain-soaked ring at Philadelphia. The champion's contract conforms with the rule placing a maximum of 37 1-2 per cent.
