—GRIEF STRICKEN FAMILY.—Among the most grief stricken and bereft families, as a result of the ravishing, recent epidemic, is that of the family of Archibald Bernard, Tignish, in whose home, five deaths have taken place within the short space of fourteen days. Ferdinand aged 19; while in Trenton, N. S., contracted influenza and died within twenty-four hours. His body was brought home for burial and the day following his interment, two other sons remaining, Fidel aged 26 and Emile aged 16 died within a few hours of each other. The former leaving a sorrowing wife and three small children. Their lately widowed son-in-law Edward Perry, who at that time had been residing with this family also contracted the dread disease and lived but eight days after the others. He leaves to mourn one little daughter Alice. The youngest daughter, Mrs. Emily Peters, came to assist in nursing the remaining survivors and succumbed after a short illness of four days, at the early age of 21. She leaves to mourn besides her parents and one solitary sister, a husband and young daughter. The sincerest sympathy of all is felt for these grief burdened but still heroic parents in his dreadful calamity.
