POLICE COURT.—One drunk appeared before the Charlottetown Police Court Saturday. He was fined \$2.00 or ten days.

INWARD TRAVEL.—The western express arrived in Charlottetown Saturday at 11.30 a.m., on time; the Summerside accommodation at 5.30 p.m., fifteen minutes late, and the Georgetown special at 12.25.

EARL GREY ARRIVES.—The Earl Grey arrived in Georgetown Saturday at 10.13 a.m., from Pictou with express, 16 1/2 tons of freight, 100 sacks of paper and letter mail and 20 passengers. She will leave for Pictou this morning.

FUNERAL NOTICE.—The funeral of the late Rev. John Hawley will take place today, Monday, in the Presbyterian Church at Marshfield, the service to begin at two o'clock. The funeral cortege will proceed to Suffolk station, interment being at Waterville, N. S.

MATCH RACE.—The match race between Parklyn and Mamie P. for a \$200.00 wager, \$100.00 a side, will take place on the ice speedway this afternoon. The first heat will be called at two o'clock sharp and the same officials that acted Saturday will officiate.

WELCOME NEWS.—A letter received by R. Matheson of the P. E. I. R., Charlottetown, from his son Frank, who is at present in Vancouver, states that he has sufficiently recovered from his recent severe attack of typhoid fever to be able to resume his work. Frank was a well known baseball fan having played on the Orlebar team here and his friends will be glad to hear of his recovery.

LOOKING FOR INFORMATION.—J. J. Hughes, M. P., Souris, has given notice that he will move his address for a copy of the memorial presented to the Government during the Session of 1911-12 by a delegation from the Government of Prince Edward Island, asking for an increased Provincial Subsidy, a copy of which Memorial was laid on the table of the House by the Finance Minister last Session of Parliament, but it not now apparent on the files of the House.

RICH GOLD DISCOVERY.—It will be good news to many Guardian readers to learn that a rich discovery of silver and gold has just been made in Nenzel Mountain, California, the site of the Codd Mines, in which quite a number of Prince Edward Islanders are interested. A California paper says the ore runs 200 ounces silver and 400 ounces gold to the ton. The camp is wild with excitement and operations are going on day and night. As a result of the discovery Codd Mines' stock jumped ten points the following day.

THE ROYAL GAME.—There are a number of citizens who have been enjoying a "chess" evening at private residences lately, but it has been felt that this idea, (as pleasant as it may be) is not general enough to have a competition, open to all say two Saturday afternoons, early in March, each competitor playing two games with every player entered. RHODES SCHOLAR.—The President of the University of King's College, Windsor, received yesterday the following cablegram from Sir George R. Parkin, secretary of "The Rhodes Scholarship Trust": "Collett appointed Prince Edward Island scholar. Parkin, Augury, London." A. L. Collett, the student referred to, is taking his arts course at King's and is now in his fourth year. When the above cablegram to the student body at luncheon. "Mr. Collett was greeted with hearty applause. Dr. Powell, on behalf of the faculty, congratulated him and wishing him God-speed, said:—"May you do yourself justice and be a credit to your alma mater." Mr. Collett, who is of a somewhat retiring disposition, briefly replied thanking all for their interest and encouragement and promising on his part not to forget Prince Edward Island or his own university.
