DIED IN THE WEST.—Mr. Fred Wayne of Hunter River, arrived home yesterday by the Minto accompanying the remains of his brother, William Wayne, who died at Maple Creek, Sask., on the morning of the twelfth instant. The circumstances of his death are very sad. Mr. Wayne who had been spending the winter in Lowell, Mass., arrived in Maple Creek, on March 2nd, to visit his son, James, who is ill with tuberculosis, in the General Hospital and who is not expected to recover. When in Maple Creek, Mr. Wayne contracted pneumonia, and died after an illness of only ten days. He leaves to mourn three sons, Alfred at Glenside, Sask., James, who has been engaged in farming in Maple Creek for the past four years, and Howard at Bungay. His wife died some years ago. He also leaves his aged parents Mr. and Mrs. William Wayne, of Hunter River, and the following brothers and sisters, Fred at Hunter River, Robert, George, and James at Bungay, Mrs. George Mumford, Charlottetown, Mrs. Jacob Smith, Bungay and Mrs. Albert Matthews, Concord, N. H.

HISTORIC.—In the Montrose (Scotland) Standard of January 3rd, 1913, appears the following notice:—"The historic interest surrounding the earlier times in Montrose has not been lost sight of by a number of its leading present-day citizens, and the little function held in Castle street on Saturday evening to commemorate the tercentenary of the birth of the Marquis of Montrose revives interest in that historic pile, now the residence of Mr. J. A. Ford. It was on the invitation of that gentleman and his good lady that the "brotherhood of twelve" assembled in and candle light gathered in the birth room of the great Marquis, where from Balis Jas. G. Low, the company was privileged to listen to an important historic address well stored with knowledge of earlier times. In the same building it is interesting to observe that James VIII., slept previously to leaving Scotland for France, and on 3rd February, 1416. When Mr. and Mrs. James Paton, Charlottetown, recently visited Scotland they were the guests while in Montrose of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ford who now reside in "the historic pile," mentioned above. It will also be remembered that Miss Ford, daughter of Mr. J. A. Ford, spent a summer in Charlottetown a year or two ago, the guest of her friend Miss Bell Paton, (Mrs. John Fraser,) and it is pleasing to hear that it is the intention of Miss Ford and her sister to spend the greater part of the coming summer in Charlottetown visiting her friends."
