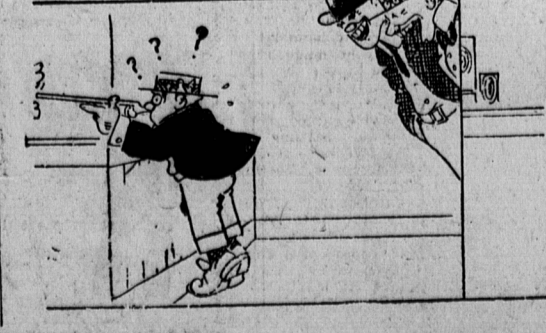

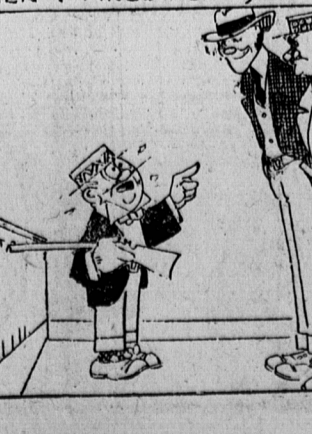

DICKY DIPPY'S DIARY

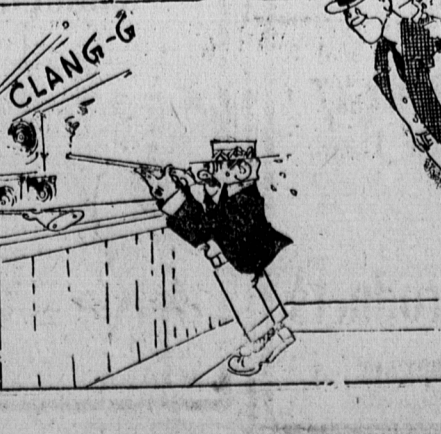
