Now I propose, as an appeal to the Patriotism of these chosen ones that they assemble together and permit thirty of their number to be chosen as our representatives in the whole Sixty Candidates to be called to meet in Charlottetown or Summerside or any other convenient centre and that one half of the Liberal candidates retire and the balance go in by acclamation.

This would give us a House of fit, free men of Conservative views and fifteen men of Liberal views, without the stress of an election. It would mean, however, that Summerside, for instance would lose a representative in the Ministry, as both members from that district are in the Executive. The

selection could be made by lot or any measure that suggested itself to the individual candidates. I wonder if they are Patriotic and game enough to play it out and form a business administration to handle our affairs till this war is concluded? This election is going to cost this Province a lot of money: If we have money to spend why not give us a chance to spend it in something that is going to be beneficial to the Empire.
