OPTION TAKEN UP.—Taylor & Hannington, acting under instructions from Ernest Mansfield, yesterday took up the option of the assets of the West Kootenay Brick & Lime Company, including the Balfour brickyard and the marble quarry opposite Kaslo. The option was for \$25,000, and the final payment of \$15,000, was made yesterday. Mr. Mansfield has succeeded in organizing a very strong company to operate the properties and special attention will be paid to the production of marble, for which a strong demand exists. The quarry will be worked on a large scale with the most improved machinery, and shipments will be made to the coast, Winnipeg, Spokane and other points. The proper development of this industry will be of considerable benefit to Nelson, and the successful flotation of the company is another tribute to Mr. Mansfield's energy and enterprise, and to the confidence reposed in his judgment by old country capital.

The above clipping is taken from a Nelson, B. C. paper of the 30th ult. Some of our readers may recollect about a year ago a number of shares in this Company were advertised for sale in the columns of the GUARDIAN at par value and were recommended by the party who had them for sale. We are informed that in addition to the stockholders receiving the 10 per cent dividend which was guaranteed them, they have received a bonus of 20 per cent on all the preference stock held by them, and the holders of the ordinary stock realized a net profit of over \$14,000.00. It is not often that such a successful investment is offered in Charlottetown and we hope some fortunate holders are among us. We believe that two former citizens of Charlottetown were heavy holders of this stock.

P. E. I. PRODUCE.—There are several vessels in port selling produce, but the business is not very brisk this season. A certain amount of retailing is being done, but there are no large sales on ordinary wholesale account or on export account. There is customarily a demand from the United States, but this year there has been no call from that quarter. Here the schooners have been finding it rather dull. Potatoes are hardly in demand at all and the price is only nominal at 25c to 30c. Turnips are selling at 25c, but people are now pretty well supplied. But the demand is only local. Oats are selling at 36c to 37c.—Maritime Merchant.
