REVEALS TRUE CONDITIONS IN SASKATCHEWAN

Premier J. T. M. Anderson Issues Statement to Correct Exaggerated Reports of Situation in Prairie Province.

REGINA, SASK., Oct. 15.—Declaring his faith, and that of the people, in Southern Saskatchewan, Premier Dr. J. T. M. Anderson today issued a statement to the press. The statement follows, in part:

"In view of the many exaggerated reports prevalent throughout Canada relative to conditions in the southern part of the Province of Saskatchewan, I feel it my duty as prime Minister to place before the people of Canada the situation as it actually exists.

"In the first place may I point out in the years 1894 and 1895 a very large section of the vast area known as the Northwest territories experienced two successive years of drought with its resultant hardship among the people of that day. Succeeding these for a period of 35 years or until the year 1929 there was no serious crop failures in what is now the province of Saskatchewan.

Droughts in 1929, 1930, 1931 "In 1929 a great section of the finest wheat-growing land in the world was affected by drought to be followed by similar conditions in the year 1930 and 1931. In 78 rural municipalities of the south-central area of the province there have been no crops for three years and in approximately 90 other municipalities none for two years. The resources of our people in these areas have been very largely used up and it has become necessary for the state to assist its people who have been so harshly affected by climatic conditions over which they obviously have no control.

Provincial Relief Commission "A provincial relief commission has been set up and relief officers have been appointed in the various municipalities to be assisted by local advisory committees with a view to providing food, clothing, fodder and fuel or the people in need of assistance and every effort is being put forth with a view to seeing that no one suffers from any lack of the necessities of life during the coming winter months. We appreciate to the fullest extent the kindly interest shown by people of Eastern Canada in our western problems and for the tangible evidence of this interest. It is right that we should as Canadians help each other in times of stress and we shall all be the better for it.

"Saskatchewan has been hard hit as a result of circumstances beyond our control but her people are still imbued with the spirit of optimism and are building with hope and faith as to the future. They are bravely facing conditions and realize to the fullest extent that no victories are won by flight and no provincial problems solved by tears.

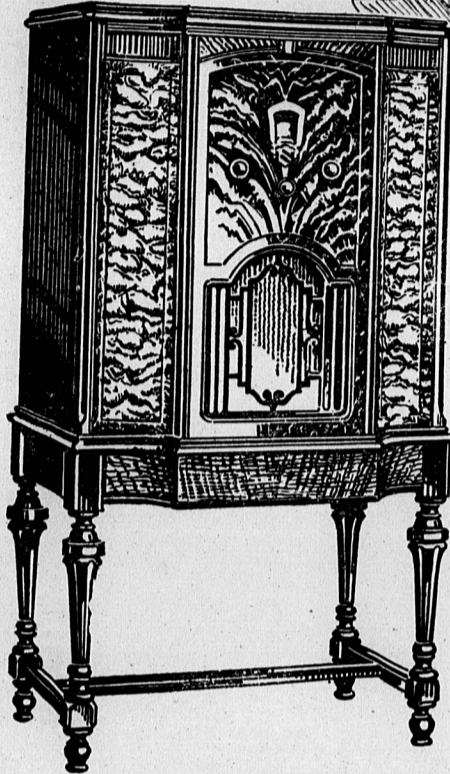
