### LOLLIPOP DOLLS

Lollipop dolls are inexpensive and very easy to dress. To make a lollipop doll, twist a pipe cleaner around the stick right under the candy part of the lollipop, for the arms. On a round piece of white paper make the eyes, nose, and mouth with pencil or ink. Tie this face around the candy part of the lollipop. Over the face draw tightly some transparent cellophane and tie it in the back with string. Make a blouse and a full skirt from bright-colored crepe paper, long enough to cover the stick. Sew the dress on the doll with needle and thread. Make a sash around the waist, with a bow.

### Going Marketing in Great Britain today

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (AP)—Suppose you take a market basket and go looking for food in a suburban shopping district of London today.

We take a double-deck bus, pay three pence for the ride that in pre-war days was a penny.

We hop off at the equivalent of the "Five Avenues" in London, a "Thrupence and Sixpence" store.

There is always something one needs in such a place. This crowded store has its food counters, too. They are full of canned soups, fruits, relatives, fish such as sardines and kipper snacks, malted milk packets, these little self-heating flour, dried fruits and the like. There is plenty of tea cakes and candy. No ration cards here, and no shortage for the fellow who has sixpence.

But we are after more sturdy stuff and go out again to the meat markets. You would think that had had no find in the windows, below the roasting and stewing cuts of strictly rationed beef, mutton and veal hanging on their silver hooks, trays of unrationed "edible offals."

There are hearts, kidneys, liver, tripe and the like, and sausages which are half meat and half bread crumbs, the meat content of sausages being prescribed by law. One has to snap these things up quickly. But one can shop for offals where you please, whereas you must go for bacon, butter, sugar, cooking fat and fresh meat to the store at which you are registered.

One leg of lamb, or its equivalent, is all the fresh meat we are entitled to for the week. It has already been ordered. So we pick up some liver to go with the slim allowance of bacon we shall pick up at our own store along with the week's butter and sugar ration. It is not big but will serve amply.

### The Bakery

Next comes the bakery. There is certainly no sign of what here. You would think that had had no effect upon these things if you were making a quick tour, but we who live in London in peace as well as in war, find it difficult to believe that the bakeries of London are anything but a scene of confusion.

Bakery confections which look many eggs have diminished in number. The splendid sugar ices have disappeared, and what remains is the cream of yesterday. Cakes have taken its place as a flavoring. We choose a loaf of milk bread, a jelly roll, a satsuma cake, and a much decorated gâteau. We spent the equivalent of half a dollar and are on our way to the vegetable and fruit stores.

Here are white stalks of celery, bundles of fat leeks, heads of watercress, the first winter crop of mushrooms and bins of potatoes, Cabbages and cauliflower and big pies of Brussels sprouts are prominent. There is no longer the heaping whipped cream decorations. Cream fillings have given place to the corn starch kind, and what is the occasion of yesterday? Cakes have taken its place as a flavoring.

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### From A Window in Fleet Street

(Written in the Ottawa Journal's London Bureau)

LONDON, November—From a soldier who has just returned from the Libyan desert front, and who is an old campaigner of the last war with Germany, I obtained an amusing account of a recent episode in that rather hectic neighborhood.

It seems we put up a small "show." It was nothing serious, just a feeling against the Italian front line, and no more than a company of our infantry was engaged. The show was a bit of a flop, to use the identical words of the military narrator, because some of our men unable to resist the temptation of an inviting target, opened fire before they were officially means to. But the result was extraordinary. The entire Italian front burst into violent activity. They fired away on a wide sector for five mortal hours with everything they had got.

Our troops were immensely delighted by such evidence of "wind up," and one subaltern declared it was like an Eton anniversary celebration, with all the fireworks, but no portrait of the King and Queen. He also told me that there are no German troops in Libya, except perhaps a few technicians. The Italian organization and road-making are good, but they are no match for desert scrapping.

There was rather an intense night blitzkrieg on, and with two other members, the writer emerged from a club shelter with object of sampling conditions with a view to making for home. One of the triumvirate was an air warden in the hat complete. Another was a bright "Fleece Street" man, who was a war correspondent with our B. E. F. up to the Dunkirk withdrawal, and was himself an airman in the last war. In fact, he claims to have dropped the first bomb the R. C. bestowed on Germany in that conflict.

Suddenly almost overhead sounded the drone of aerial engines. "We'd better get down again," commented the warden. They will be dropping something. "Ohno," responded the ex-airman nonchalantly, "these are old saps all right. You can't mistake them. Just as he spoke there came an ominous whistling overhead, and down showed a stick of H. E. bombs. To do him justice the expert was not bigoted. He was easily first down the shelter steps.

His Mistake. But even genuine expert is frequently very much at sea in his prognostications. The writer had a very amusing example of this a few nights ago.
