THE Prince of Wales College and Model School re-opens to-day at 10 o'clock.

THE S. S. St. Olaf with fifty excursionists from Picou and Westville N.S., arrived in the city at noon on Saturday. The Westville band accompanied them and played several choice selections in the Gardens.

MR. JONATHAN McWILLIAMS has left a sample of oats at this office which measures five feet six inches in height. The grain was cut on his farm in the Royalty.

ON September 1st at Georgetown before Stipendiary Blanchard, Prosecutor Bears secured a conviction against Mary Ann McDonald of Georgetown Royalty. An adjourned case against Mrs. McAuley of Annandale was dismissed for want of evidence.

THOS. HENRY of Georgetown has just received word of the safe arrival of the barquentine Hornet at Rio Grande de Sul after an exceedingly long passage of 102 days. Mr. Henry's sister left Georgetown about the middle of May to join her husband, Capt. McDonald in New York, and sailed from that port on the 20th of May for Rio Grande, the vessel being delayed by calms. The many friends of Capt. and Mrs. McDonald were becoming somewhat anxious of their safety.

RALPH SMITH has requested the Herald to challenge Walter Myra on his behalf for a single scull race for the amateur championship of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island. Smith was protested against Wednesday at Waverly by a representative of the Lorne Club, who alleged that he was not an amateur within the strict meaning of the word. The referee decided to allow Smith to start, but the latter declined, preferring to fight it out alone with Myra in a championship race, for which a silver cup will be offered.—Halifax Herald.

PREDICTION NOT VERIFIED.—La Grande Duchesse arrived in Boston at 7.30 Friday morning, with St. Patrick's excursionists. A large number refused to go on the steamer, because there was some old woman prediction that she would be wrecked on the trip. Her safe arrival relieved considerable anxiety.

THE whole Island should attend the Races on the Charlottetown Driving Park on the 14th inst., as the fastest horses that have ever trotted on this track have entered in the Free-for-all class to be trotted that day. Warren Gay's name has been a household word as the fastest trotter in the Maritime Provinces with a record of 2:12 1/4. All the other horses in that class are fast; Minota, 2:19 1/4; Montrose, 2:20 1/4; and Provider, 2:21 1/4; Minnie, 2:24 1/4; Beau Prince, 2:28 and Belmont, 2:30.

THE regular monthly conference meeting of the Main street Baptist church congregation was exceptionally well attended Friday evening as it was the last time retiring Pastor Gordon would officiate before his departure for Montreal. The service of prayer and Christian testimony was a spirited one. At the close of the ordinance of baptism was administered in the church auditorium. On Sunday the Main street pulpit will be occupied by Rev. Howard P. Whidden, of Galt, Ont.—St. John Telegraph.

SOUTH EASTERN ITEM.—Harvesting has commenced and the weather is all that could be desired. Wheat is very good, and the probabilities are that but very little, if any, imported flour need be used in the Island this coming winter. Oats are far superior to the growth of the past few years. In good, rich land the growth is simply enormous. Many old and observant farmers declare that they never saw such a good all round crop in these sections.—China Point wharf is being repaired by Mr. Alexander Compton, of French Creek.—Rev. D. B. McLeod is expected to visit his friends in the Orwell congregation.

WEST POINT NOTES.—The mackerel fishing has been a total failure here this year. There was a slight improvement in the catch of lobsters, but the catch of cod was very slight. Even the fish are disgusted at the inability of the Government to establish and enforce right laws regulating their capture, and therefore they are leaving the waters to protect themselves.—We are glad to have our genial friend, Mr. Angus Steele back in our midst after a short sojourn in New Brunswick. He says that there is no demand for labor there, wages being low and board high. He concludes that there is no place like P. E. Island, where a man can enjoy himself and live by the least possible physical exertion.—Two of our most popular and amiable young ladies, Misses Mary McDonald and Annie Crawford, have gone to Boston, where they intend to remain for some time. The good wishes for their welfare and happiness of a large circle of friends will follow them to their new place of abode.—There have been a few few vessels loading off our new wharf since it was built. With an extension of two or three hundred feet more there would be sufficient water for any of the Gulf port boats from Montreal to lay by and make in any freight going north from this section. What a boon this would be to our farmers as it would bring them in direct communication with the Provincial markets.
