A FIVE MILLION DOLLAR LIFE POLICY

NEW YORK, Aug. 17—Adolph Zuker has taken out a life insurance policy for five million dollars in favor of the company of which he is the head, a prominent agent announced today. This is regarded as the largest policy ever taken out by an individual to protect a business. The previous record is said to have been a policy of \$1,500,000 on the late Thomas L. Shevlin, which was in favor of the lumber corporations which he headed. When the policy was written he was regarded as the perfect risk.

Thrilling Experience In Open Boat

QUEBEC, Aug. 18—The thrilling experience of having his ship burned up and being compelled to embark with the whole of his crew in a small open boat befell Captain J. Barton of Newfoundland who arrived here on the S. S. Maid of Syria. Captain Barton said, "I left Newfoundland on the Roxana Burton on June 11th with a cargo of fish for Naples and on the 11th of July, when we were about fifty miles from the Spanish coast, fire broke out in the engine room and despite all our endeavours to extinguish it spread all over the ship. We had no choice but to take to our boats and there was no time to take either her water or any provisions with us. We spent fifteen hours in the most ghastly anxiety and suspense on the open sea in our little craft and were profoundly thankful when the British steamer Novelly picked us up and put us ashore in Spain."

Germans and Polish Troops are Fighting

BERLIN, Aug. 18—Twenty-four Poles were killed and many wounded today in a fight between the Germans and regular Polish troops near the frontier in the villages of Sternitz and Kostelitz in Upper Silesia. The Germans drove the Poles across the frontier.

COMMITTEE WILL ADVISE TREASURY

LONDON, August 17—In the House of Commons today Sir Robert Home, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced the formation of a committee to advise the Treasury respecting national finances, the committee to consist of Sir Eric Geddes, chairman, Lord Farrington, Lord Inchcape, Sir Joseph Paton MacLay and Sir Guy Granet. The committee, said Sir Robert, would deliberate on the Treasury report of the Chancellor of the Exchequer and be charged with the duty of making recommendations to the Chancellor of the Exchequer for effecting forthwith all possible reductions in national expenditures on supply services, having regard to the present prospective conditions of the revenue.

Questions of policy would remain for the exclusive consideration of the Cabinet, it was announced, but it would be open to the committee to deal with questions of policy. The Treasury organization would be employed as in the ordinary course for the purpose of committee work and some other member of the Civil Service would be seconded for the work with it. The committee, said Sir Robert, would be provided with all information requisite to perform its task, but would not necessarily take formal evidence, and the question of publishing its report would remain for consideration.

MADE IN CANADA

Omar's Followers Were Boozing Under Guise Of Religious Worship

Application Granted To Brotherhoods

TORONTO, Aug. 18—The Minister of Labor granted an application to the five big Railway Brotherhoods for an appointment of a Board of Conciliation to pass upon the wage schedule to be put into force on Canadian lines.

Word to this effect was received by the Brotherhood committee at Montreal and transmitted to Toronto.

David Campbell of Winnipeg is the Brotherhood's representative. A customary five days has been given to the Railway Association to name its representative.

WAR PREDICTED

BERLIN, August 17—General Ludendorff openly prophesies another war. During a visit to Keoningsberg for the anniversary of the battle of Tannenberg, he delivered a "Prussian speech" before an audience of enthusiastic Prussian Nationalists, characterizing himself as "Hindenburg's representative and fellow fighter of Tannenberg and representative of the old army."

Then, referring to East Prussia as "completely cut off and waves of Poles beating upon it from all sides," he declared, emphatically: "I do not doubt that in a few years we will have to fight for the Ostmark (the present and former Russian provinces in the East), the fate of our Fatherland will sooner or later be decided. Then, when the hour strikes, recall what brought us victory at Tannenberg—the iron will of leadership and death-defying courage. The greater the Fatherland's straits, the closer we rally round its black and white Prussian banner. Proudly we profess ourselves Prussians and want to remain Prussians."

Simultaneously Ludendorff's press agent slipped a letter into the Nationalistic Taegheine Rundschau praising "Ludendorff's farsightedness" and holding him as the real saviour of Upper Silesia, with the following fantastic argument: "Ludendorff," says his anonymous admirer, "repeatedly received high English military personages and impressed on them the danger of Bolshevism, against which Germany was the last bulwark in Europe."

When we thought it was about time the services should commence, we timidly asked somebody when the devotional services would begin. "Services," all over, have a drink," he sleepily replied. "It came as a shock to our confiding nature to realize we were in the very heart of a fine old-time booze party and nearly everybody was lit up. We remember very little more of what took place after this, but our eyes were open to the sinister purposes of this set, whose main object was to imitate the old Persian rascal and hold a weekly party under the guise of religious worship."

In the same issue of The Herald is a letter signed "Church Managing committee of the True Faith," which denies vigorously "the misconception abroad that our members are nothing but a gang of hootch hounds, whose sole aim in life is to drink the maximum amount of liquor in the minimum amount of time." The letter declares the views of the Cult to be so broad that not even total abstinence is denied membership and it concludes: "The Cult of Omar has not been disrupted, as has been stated. True, services have been temporarily suspended, pending the arrival of a special consignment of Spirit of Omar; but, once this arrives, services will be renewed with zest. Some of our weakened brethren have been lured away by threats of our enemies and false and libellous reports published about us; but others remain staunch and true to the cause. No doubt as soon as the new cargo of Spirit of Omar arrives, the erring ones will come sneaking back into the fold, and such is our generosity that we will welcome them back to the true faith with open arms and without reproach, providing, of course they delve deeply to induce the flow of the spirit."

Like-wise he handed his monograph on the same subject to prominent Englishmen, including General Malcolm, a fact which caused considerable dissatisfaction in Teuton Nationalistic circles at the time. "Now," writes his admirer, "it turns out that Ludendorff was possessed of marvellous foresight in so doing, because his authority as a military leader commands great respect the world over." The English were so impressed by Ludendorff's bulwark against Bolshevism as to decidedly influence their cabinet to favor Germany in the Upper Silesian question.
