**SOUTH AFRICAN POST CARDS POPULAR**

(Canadian Press)  
 JOHANNESBURG, S. Africa, Oct. 29.—Picture postcards depicting the wild life of South Africa have been placed on sale and are proving popular. It is an unique series from photographs taken in various parts of the country, mainly in the game reserves, and the pictures range over a great variety of subjects. A point of particular interest about the cards is that they are the first postcards to be issued in South Africa of enlarged size now allowed by the International Postal Union. This permits of the actual pictures being nearly 5 1/2 by 3 1/2 inches, which is appreciably larger than the space obtainable on an ordinary-sized card. Each card carries a bilingual appeal to protect Africa's wild life.

**LOOK TO SOUTH AMERICA**

Brazil and the Argentine offer Canadian manufacturers a market for their surplus products that should not be overlooked or spurned, in the opinion of Capt. J. H. Budd, a Canadian who has spent more than 20 years in South America. Other countries, particularly Great Britain and the United States, are taking advantage of the opportunity and are profiting by it, declared Capt. Budd. "Brazil is stable, basically and fundamentally," said Capt. Budd. "The recent upheaval in the Argentine is the first in 33 years, yet Canadians let the constant bickering of eastern republics and those fronting on the Caribbean Sea affect their opinions of Brazil and Argentina. "If Canadians want to seize the field offered them, they should cooperate with Brazil and Argentina. Hundreds of their students come to the United States every year and get an American outlook. That might be just as well Canadian, and Canadians are better liked. "Canadians have a better opportunity because American business methods are disliked. The quiet British methods have resulted in vast British investments. British capital controls cattle raising, much wheat growing and public utilities in Argentina. Next year a British business fair is to be held in Buenos Aires, and the Prince of Wales is to open it."
