of guerilla resistance in the interior. At all events, it was regarded as the most important in view of the spirited though brief defence of the great bulk of effective French troops had been accounted for.

What Will Vichy Do?
The Vichy government would do no more than the most intense interest.

Tonight Vichy announced capitulation of Diego Suarez, and Berlin broadcast a Vichy report that the British naval units had entered the harbor at 3:30 p.m. Vichy claimed resistance was continuing elsewhere on the island.

The German-controlled Paris press began calling for reprisals; there was some speculation here that Laval might take the excuse to hand over to the Axis some form of naval aid—perhaps French cruisers and destroyers to the German fleet.

The conquest of Diego Suarez, which in the terminology of British charts stands for the whole of the bay and not merely the French naval base, was a great achievement by powerful British land and naval forces—Commandos, marines, regular infantry, warships placed in the bay of strength which, Mr. Churchill said, was deliberately intended to hold bloodstained to a minimum.

A large string of ships carrying "important war supplies" to the bitterly-contested Russian front. Although it was attacked by repeated waves of dive-bombers and torpedo-carrying planes which sank three ships, the British sailors nevertheless succeeded in delivering 90 per cent of their cargo, the Admiralty stated.

Assuming all of the convoy ships were of approximately the same size, this would indicate that the convoy originally was composed of about 30 ships.

Casualties apparently were relatively small, although it was not specifically stated.

Lasted Four Days
The attacks on the two convoys began April 30 and lasted through May 3. The homeward-bound convoy was struck first, a submarine's torpedo disabling the Edinburgh's steering gear on the afternoon of April 30.

The Edinburgh was able to proceed under her own power, but at speed reduced below her normal 30 1-2 knots. This slowed, she and the convoy were attacked the following afternoon in stormy weather by three destroyers which made five separate attempts to break through the escort and destroy the convoy, each one being beaten off. It was in this fighting that the one convoyed ship, which was in ballast, went down. Seven men were killed on two other ships.

On the morning of May 2 the crippled Edinburgh again was accosted by three German destroyers, apparently the same ones, in heavy weather and low visibility. The Edinburgh now was in tow, but she and British destroyers engaged the German ships, and this time one of the Nazi destroyers and severely damaged a second.

During the fight another torpedo hit the Edinburgh. "She was abandoned," said the Admiralty, "and later had to be sunk by our own forces, as towing was no longer practicable in the weather conditions prevailing."

This convoy was not bothered again.

The attack on the outward-bound convoy was begun on the afternoon of May 1, by six Junkers 88 bombers striking suddenly from the stormy sky. One of them was shot down, then the convoy and its escort went unscathed.

On the evening of the following day, six torpedo-carrying planes attacked, and three of the convoyed ships were struck by torpedoes and sunk. In this assault one of the attackers was shot down.

A final attack came on the evening of May 3. This last thrust was unsuccessful, causing only minor damage to one ship. One Junker 88 was shot down.

This Arctic action presumably was the same in which the German high command three days ago claimed a 10,000-ton British cruiser had been sunk. The Germans then claimed that the convoyed ships totalling 37,500 tons also were sunk.

Several members spoke of the matter and it was generally expressed that a central hall was the best way of taking care of the situation.

Mr. Brennan stated that a proposal had been made to have the present town hall extended at the back to enlarge the present fire station and that the floor above would make an excellent hall.

Mr. Arnett said he thought this would be a good opportunity to acquire a public hall which has been a long felt want in the town. It would be something that would be of lasting service to the citizens. Now with the government guaranteeing part of the cost of construction, this was an opportune time to secure it and at the same time to take care of the entertainment of the troops stationed here.

The proposal was favourably received by the members and a resolution passed moved by Mr. Arnett, that a committee of five be appointed to meet the town council at their meeting this evening to take the matter before them for their opinion. On the committee were A. R. Brennan; H. T. Holman; J. F. Arnett; John E. Campbell and R. H. Leck.

A resolution moved by J. Frank Arnett was passed asking the government to have the Summerside post office reclassified as the volume of business has so increased these changes are necessary to cope with the situation.

Mr. H. T. Holman reporting for the tourist committee stated that matters of interest to the tourist trade were being looked upon specially in relation to Summerside.—S.
