GRAHAME-WHITE BETTERS RECORD

BOSTON, Sept. 12—American and English aviators competed in what was probably the most daring and spectacular battle for supremacy of the air ever fought out during the history of aviation at the next to the last day of competition for the prizes in the Harvard-Boston aero meet at Atlantic today.
