THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

It is pleasant to find many good things coming our way at this genial season after the long winter of our discontent. First and foremost the Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island; then the National Council of Women; followed by the Home Comers, and later the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces. These are some of the more important annual gatherings of interprovincial interest and importance which are this year to honor the Island with their presence. When we get the Tunnel all the churches, and societies may be expected to bring their annual assemblies, conferences, conventions, supreme courts, grand lodges and all that sort of thing to these sweet fields beyond the swelling flood. But that is another story, as Kipling would remark.

Just now we have the Methodist Ministers and representative laymen of two Provinces in our midst and we extend them a hearty welcome. In doing so, (with apologies to Tennyson) we would say: Presbyterians, Churchmen and Baptists are we—all of us Methodists in our welcome. It is not now as it was half a century ago, when the Presbyterian Episcopate was wont to vex the Methodist Judah, in regard to foreordination, or the Wesleyan Judah, to grow envious of the Baptist Israel because there was so much water in his pasturage. Today there is not a Presbyterian or a Baptist pastor in Charlottetown or the region round about that will not gladly declare his pulpit vacant in order that any ordained Wesleyan may be inducted thereto for at least one Sabbath day's ministrations. And they may safely do so, even if the Methodist brother should take Wesley's hymns along and substitute them for the Metrical Version or the Spiritual Songs of Dr. Watts.

Some of these days this sort of thing may lead on to closer union of an organic sort, although the Baptist brotherhood still show no sign of weakening on the question of a sub-aqueous mode of entrance to the visible church. Be that as it may it is sweet and pleasant to find so many past differences, buried out of sight and brethren of differing creeds dwelling together in unity. We have passed that stage in the world's history where a man's creed was thought more important than his character. But this is a digression. The Conference has much important work to do, and we are assured it will be done in a methodical and business-like manner.

Work pertaining to the churches, to missions, to Sunday schools and Epworth Leagues, and the noble educational institutions at Mount Allison, (of which all Canada is justly proud) and work of stationing the ministers, and much other work must be attended to. Methodist polity and the itinerant system especially, tend to give every Methodist Minister a very wide circle of acquaintances, and not a few members of the Conference now coming from abroad were at some time residents on the Island. We trust that this fact will not detract from the pleasure of their visit. We feel assured that it will enhance the satisfaction of their entertainers.

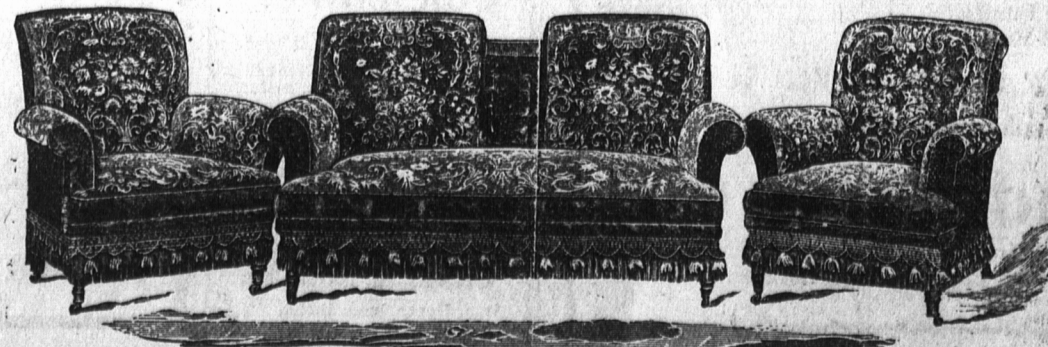
