TERRIBLE CYCLONE

Whose fury Breaks all
Records.

117 PERSONS KILLED

Four Hundred wounded—
Property loss enormous—
Three States swept.

ST. PAUL, June 13.—[Special]—The most appalling cyclone that has yet visited North America took place last night, sweeping through portions of three states.

One hundred and seventy-five killed and four hundred wounded is the record of the night's disaster.

The tornado plowed its way right through the centre of New Richmond. Heavy damage was also done at Hudson, Wisconsin and Hastings, Michigan.

After the cyclone came fire, doing great damage.

All train communication is blocked.

The cyclone was the worst ever known and it will be days before full details of its awful havoc are compiled.

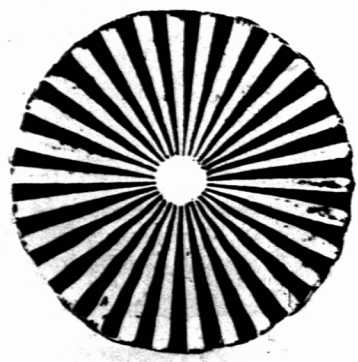

AFFAIRS OF FRANCE

Poincare to be the New
Premier.

M. LOUBET'S ASSAILANT

Gets four years in Prison—
Col. Picquart Regains
his liberty.

PARIS, June 13.—[Special]—The general opinion is that M. Poincare will be called to the Premier ship.

Baron Christiani, who assaulted President Loubet with a cane at the Anteuil races was sentenced to four years imprisonment and costs.

The Chamber of Indictment today exonerated and liberated Col. Picquart and his counsel Maite le Blois, imprisoned in connection with the Dreyfus case.

M. Poincare, who is probably the coming Premier, is Deputy for Mense in the Chamber and has been Minister of Public Instruction.

He also gave testimony before the Court of Cassation when the case for the revision of Dreyfus' sentence was before that body.

WINNIPEG, June 13.—[Special]—Premier Greenway told a delegation that the plebiscite votes showed that the people wanted prohibition.

He had endeavored to get legislation at Ottawa concurrent with any action taken by Manitoba and failing that he pledged himself to pass a local prohibitory law to the fullest extent of his power.

OTTAWA, June 13.—[Special]—Hon. Mr. Fielding's Ottawa city bill provides for the annual payment of \$60,000 to be spent by a commission in beautifying the city carrying out the idea of "The Washington of the North."

A BOAT UPSETS

Throwing the Occupants
Into the Water.

PICKED UP BY A BOAT.

Would Have Been Drowned
Were it Not for the
Timely Rescue.

CONSIDERABLE sensation was caused in the city last evening when it was rumored on the streets that what was nearly terminating in a drowning accident had happened in the afternoon at 6 p. m. Two boats were on their way out of the harbor. When off the Warren farm the one occupied by two men named Ferguson and Murphy suddenly capsized. The boat carried considerable ballast and immediately sank to the water's edge. The other boat stood by and rescued the men and towed the first mentioned boat across the harbor. Only for the timely aid of McInnis' boat both men would no doubt have been drowned.

Fishermen Doing Well.

HALIFAX, June 12.—The fishermen should be feeling rather good these days, for they are obtaining fine prices for what they bring to the market. Choice No. 1 table cod, fetches from \$4.50 to \$4.60 per quintal, considerable quantities having been purchased by merchants at the latter figure. Large and small sizes, mid. d., are worth \$4.30 per quintal. It is years since prices anything like these were obtainable. Store \$5 is a fair idea of the price of the best grade of codfish.

Potatoes that were weak in this market a week ago, have declined still further and are now not worth more than 42c. to 45c. per bushel. Local and New Brunswick stock has been pretty well cleared up, and what is now on hand is from Prince Edward Island. Stocks are plentiful and with the lower prices there is a moderate demand.

The sugar market is firm, but there has been no advance in prices. Hams that have been quoted at 11½c. and 12c. are marked down to 11c. The advance in eggs from 9c to 12c. has already been noted.
