## Standing Fields Crops Competition, 1922

Cash Prizes for Fields of Oats, Wheat, Barley, and Certified Seed Potatoes.

There will be competitions in the three counties, where there are five or more entries each for wheat, barley, oats and potatoes grown from certified seed.

The number of prizes, in each county, will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the score. For wheat and barley forty cents, oats and potatoes fifty cents a point will be paid for each point of the score above eighty.

## Rules and Regulations

- 1.—A field of oats shall consist of at least five acres, of wheat and barley three acres, of certified seed potatoes two acres.
- 2.—An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged, for the first, and fifty cents for each additional entry of grain, and \$1.00 for each entry of potatoes.
- 3.—The entry fee shall accompany the application.
- 4.—Entries shall be made to the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, not later than Aug. 15th, 1922.
- 5.—Competitors should notify the Department of Agriculture at least one week previous to date on which harvesting will begin.
- 6.—The judging will be done by representatives of the Department of Agriculture.
- 7.—Competitors are requested to note the following requirements for standing fields of oats only. The field must be seeded with (a) registered Banner Oats; (b) Seed from field, which had been sown with registered seed and inspected and approved while growing; (c) Seed from fields that have been two or more years in the competition, and have not less than 24 1-2 out of 25 points for purity approved by the Department of Agriculture.

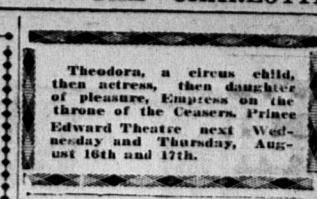

## Rebels Collect Taxes In Cork

DUBLIN, Aug. 11.—According to letters received here from Cork, the irregulars there, who are in complete possession of all the public services, including the Inland Revenue, have collected, it is estimated £100,000.

Demand notes for the income tax were sent out August 1 in the name of "the Republican Civil Administration Department." They temporarily demanded that the taxes be paid within three days. The letters say that, following this demand, the Cork Chamber of Commerce and the Cork Employers' Federation met jointly. The legal adviser to the federation strongly advised against payment of the tax to any but the accredited representatives of the Provisional Government. It was then resolved that, in consequence of refusal to comply with the demand of the Republicans any firm or individual was victimized, all firms should express their sympathy by closing down and discharging all employees.

## Irish Cut Off One Cable Line

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Communication between the United States and Ireland, France, Germany and Northern Europe, through the Commercial Cable Company, was cut off at 3 o'clock this morning probably because of seizure of the station at Waterville, Ireland by the Irish Republican Army. Officers of the company announced today.

Practically no messages are being taken for transmission to these countries, and those accepted are subject to serious delay, the company said.
