CHICAGO MARKETS. CHICAGO, January 9 (Special)—Corn, Dec., 44 1/2; Corn, May, 45 1/2; Wheat, " 57 1/2; Wheat, " 58 1/2; Pork, May, \$13.02; Pork, Jan., \$14.00.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

THE homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader reside in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by each person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

The Hilary term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday morning.

THE Chief Justice in his address to the Grand Jury spoke of the unusually large number of criminal cases and briefly referred to those before the court, viz. Lucy Murphy, charged with larceny from the house of Mr. Sanderson, North River; Isadore Peters, with breaking into the store of Wedlock Bros; McCarron with assault on policeman Walker, William Power with perjury and Jos McLeer and Geo. Loder, with horse stealing and other offences.

ON motion of Mr. Williams an order was granted for the first examination of Charles Winfield Matheson.

THE application of John T. O'Brien for certiorari to quash conviction made by Stipendiary Inna of Montague was set down for hearing on January 24th.

THE case of Crossman vs Patterson was an appeal on the part of the Plaintiff from an order made at Chambers by Mr. Justice Fitzgerald on the twenty seventh day of December last, setting aside a default marked by the Plaintiff for want of a plea. The Plaintiff contended that in this action which was slander of title the pleas of "Not Gully," and a denial that the property, an injury to which is complained of, is the Plaintiff's; which were pleaded by the Defendant in this case as set out in section eighty-nine of the Common Law Procedure Act could not be pleaded together without a Judge's order.

THE appeal came up for hearing before the full Court yesterday and was dismissed with costs against the Plaintiff.

CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT. NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Through information furnished by Salem Gazel of Brooklyn, who was locked up at police headquarters, charged with the embezzlement of a check for \$12,000 from his employer, Nanjeeve Maloof, a silk dealer, the United States customs officials seized in the saleroom of H. N. Maloof & Co., a trunk containing \$10,000 worth of lace, alleged to have been smuggled into this country.

AS soon as Gazel was taken to police headquarters he communicated with the customs officials, and gave them information which, it is alleged, led to the seizure of the trunk.

F. W. Broderick, Maritime representative, and L. H. Newman, Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Seed Growers Association, and Mr. Wm. Rennie, Toronto, Ontario, will have charge of the work.

THE program will consist of practical in grain judging, weed seed identification, and practical lectures on practical subjects.

ALL exhibits must be in place in the pavilion by one o'clock p. m. on Monday, 15th January.

NO seed shall be admitted for competition for prizes unless the quantity of seed for sale by each exhibitor is at least five bushels of wheat, ten bushels of oats or barley, five bushels of peas, five bags of potatoes, or three of timothy seed.

AN increased amount has been granted for prizes.
