POTATO PRICES—Prices varying from \$1.15 to \$1.20 per bushel are being paid for Green Mountain table stock potatoes in the Province this week. The price is a noticeable increase over recent weeks, especially at Montague, Cardigan and other eastern points, where the \$1.20 price now prevails. Cobblers are being bought at \$1.00. At Charlottetown and Summerside the price offered for Mountains yesterday was \$1.15. That the present high price of \$1.20 cannot be maintained and that a decline might be expected as early as next week, was the opinion of one prominent buyer interviewed over the telephone yesterday. Other buyers, however, expressed the belief that the market was sound and should continue strong. From ten to fifteen cents per bushel extra is being paid for fancy grade table stock in 15 pound bags at Montague and Cardigan. These shipments are chiefly for the Boston market, and are in considerable demand in the chain store trade. One buyer has already forwarded several cars in this manner.

The recent death of George Judson removes from the life and activities of Alexandria, one of its most honored and respected men. By courage, sacrifice and unswerving hope, he surmounted the many obstacles that beset his path. Mr. Vincent of the Charlottetown Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. H. E. Campbell, of Pownal United Church. The music which was led by Mrs. Beatrice Judson, consisted of old favorites of the departed. The choir rendered a special number with Mrs. Nat. MacKinnon as leading soprano and Mrs. Judson alto. The funeral was in charge of undertaker N. MacLean.

Tariff Advisory Board To Meet Next Tuesday

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 13—The Dominion cabinet, meets on Tuesday. The tariff advisory board opens its January hearings the same day. A deputation from the British Columbia Government will confer with the Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of Interior on Wednesday with regard to the return of railway and Peace River lands. A deputation from the New Brunswick Government will meet Mr. Stewart, Minister of the Interior on Wednesday to discuss a national park in that Province. The appeal of the Western Provinces on freight rates will be before the cabinet on Thursday. The Canadian Lumbermen's Association will meet in the city during the week and will inspect the Dominion Forestry Laboratory. The association will be addressed by Mr. Stewart. There will be a number of meetings of the treasury board and probably some extra meetings of the cabinet, so altogether it will be a busy week in government circles.

Zealand is growing very rapidly. This will be the second hearing of this application. A number of other applications relating to agricultural products will be heard later and on January 22 the final hearing of the steel and iron inquiry is scheduled. The investigation into the duties on steel and iron has been going on for some years and the entire schedule comprising over 200 items has been written. The final arguments will be submitted and the case closed. This will give the board almost a month to consider its final recommendations to the Minister of Finance before Parliament opens. Many observers feel that the revision of the steel and iron duties will be the big feature of the 1930 budget.
