IN MEMORIAM

MARY LAURETTA MacDONALD
On Friday, October 12th, the death took place at the City Hospital of Mary Lauretta MacDonald, graduate nurse, Miss MacDonald, who was twenty-four years of age, was the eldest daughter of the late James MacDonald and Mary MacLellan of Glenfinnan.
Scarcely had the deceased graduated as a nurse when the illness that caused her death attacked her. Realizing early in her sickness that recovery was impossible, she viewed the approach of death with fortitude and patience and a Faith in God's mercy that was a source of edification to those about her. Fortified by the "Bread of Life" in Holy Communion she made her preparation to meet the Sovereign Judge, who in His infinite love came to her every day. During her illness she was comforted by the care and kind attention of the Chief of the Medical Staff of the Hospital, by the gentle solicitude of the Reverend Sisters and Nursing Staff, by the kindly enquiries, visits and gifts of numerous friends of city and country, but all unavailing to prevent the gradual sinking, since God for her greater good called her to Himself. Cheerful, capable, kind and above all self-sacrificing, the nursing profession has certainly lost one, who by her ability and high moral character would have done credit to it.
A loving daughter and sister, her death has caused a vacancy in the home that never can be filled, a wound in a mother's heart, which only a strong Christian faith can make less painful. A faithful and generous friend, a cheerful companion she will be sincerely mourned by her sister, nurses and friends, her mother, two sisters and four brothers, namely: Helena and Penzie, Teacher, John Archie, Boston Mass., Austin St. Justina University, Daniel and James at home.
After a solemn High Mass at the City Hospital on Saturday morning, celebrated by Rev. A. J. McIntyre assisted by Revs W. V. MacDonald, D. D. Hope River, R. R. St. John, and James Rooney, Cathedral Staff, the Notre Dame Academy Choir assisting, the remains were taken to the home at Glenfinnan. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon Oct. 14th, and the long procession of carriages and automobiles that wended its way to Fort Augustus Church was a striking testimony of the esteem in which the deceased was held. The services at the Church and grave were conducted by Rev. John J. MacDonald, Summerville, Charlottetown, while the Choir was led by the Pastor Rev. A. J. MacDonald. The acting pallbearers were her six first cousins, while the honorary ones were her sister nurses, Misses McCarville, MacDonald, Connors, McIntyre and MacLellan. Eternal rest grant unto her, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon her.

Objects To Cut In New Novel

(Dominion News Service)
LONDON, Oct. 25.—Is a novel's copyright infringed if the editor of a newspaper "cuts" a novel which is appearing in serial form? The question arose before Mr. Justice McCardie in the Vacation Court, when Mr. Henn Collins, on behalf of Stephen McKenna, the novelist, applied for an injunction against the "Referee" to restrain them from an alleged infringement of copyright in a novel by Mr. McKenna.

Mr. Collins explained that Mr. McKenna, when he was approached in April last by Mr. Donald, then editor of the "Referee," agreed to sell the licence for the serial publication of the novel, which consisted of 104,000 words, for £500.
"After the publication of the first instalment," added Mr. Collins, "Mr. Donald was succeeded by Mr. George Curmook, who had different views regarding the suitability of the story for the "Referee." He invited Mr. McKenna to make cuts and alterations in the story. He did not see his way to do this, and on July 22 the "Referee" published an instalment with heavy cuts. This was an excess of authority on their part and outside the powers of their licence. There was an infringement of Mr. McKenna's copyright."

FIGHT AT THE ZOO

LONDON, Oct. 25.—A deadly fight between an African Saddle-billed Stork and a Jayan Adjutant has occurred at the Zoo.
Happily for the society, "Charlie," the stork, was not the victim, for there has been only one other of his kind on exhibition in the menagerie. The downfall of "Bob," the adjutant, was "awful head" and he lost it as a result.
He, with a male companion (both of whom were presented by the Prince of Wales), occupied a cage next to "Charlie," and over this "Bob" held sway.
Seeking, apparently, to extend his territory, "Bob" by some means or other, managed to open the intervening door.
His body was found later minus his horny cranium, which was lying fully a yard away, with "Charlie" strutting proudly around it.
A peculiarity of the Jayan Adjutant is that, when fighting, instead of thrusting and parrying with his beak in bayonet fashion, as does the Stork, he with much dancing and flapping of wings, uses his bill pincers, seeking to nip the neck of his adversary between the sharp mandibles.
