Unemployment Insurance Commission

The total sum paid in unemployment insurance benefits from the time the plan became effective in 1941 until August 31st last was \$4,837,997. For the first five months of the present fiscal year (April, May, June, July and August) benefit payments totalled \$1,532,914.

The Unemployment Insurance Commission recently gave out some information in respect to the number of claims for benefits received as well as the total amount disbursed in benefits during the period from April 1st to August 31st of the present year.

237,136 claims for benefits were received. This figure includes 24,109 claims pending on March 31st, 1948. By province the record is as follows:—

In giving this information about benefit claims the Commission emphasized the importance of obeying the regulations when making claim. Out of a total of 21,997 claims where a benefit year was established, the reason given in 20,456 claims was insufficient contributions. In the case of the first or initial claim, contributions must have been made on behalf of the claimant for at least 180 days during the two years immediately preceding the date on which the claim is made, before a benefit year can be established. In the case of a second or subsequent benefit year, the claimant must have contributed to the fund during the year immediately preceding the date on which the claim is made, and the 180 days contributions during the two years immediately preceding the date on which the claim is made of which the 60 contributions form part.

Of the 20,456 claims where there were insufficient contributions, 18,030 lacked 180 days and 2,428 lacked the 60 days.

In order to claim benefit a person must be unemployed and capable of and available for work. During the five-month period 11,666 persons who were not unemployed made application for benefit. Their claims for benefit had to be denied. More than 14,700 persons who had left their positions of their own volition without just cause were refused benefit. Benefit cannot be paid under such circumstances. The number who refused or failed to apply for suitable employment or who failed to accept suitable employment was 9,358. These claimants had to be disqualified because a claimant must accept suitable employment or tender himself liable to disqualification.

It was pointed out by the Commission that insurance officers have no choice in dealing with claims if these do not come within the four corners of the Act. They must then be thrown out. If a claimant is disqualified or if a benefit year is not established the claimant has the right to appeal to a court of referees which is made up of representatives of employers and workers on an equal basis. From the decision of the court of referees there may be a further appeal to the Umpire.
