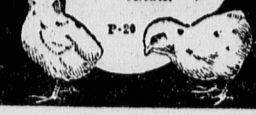

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available, Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

A Week of Dedication and Preparation for the Solemn Duty of Greater Food Production

Commencing April 22nd

Suggestions for Preparation Week

EQUIPMENT

1. Examine, repair, paint, and oil machinery.
2. Have extra swingletrees, doubletrees, and three and four horse eveners.
3. Now is the time to order spraying and harvesting machinery.
4. A lost half day may affect harvest.

HORSES

1. Increase the feed as work increases.
2. Be good to the colt, bathe his shoulders with warm brine before work starts. Use cold water on his shoulders every time he comes in from work.

CROP PLANS

1. Sow cereals in the following order, as soon as possible after the land is ready to be worked; wheat, oats, peas, then barley.
2. Plant potatoes and corn when the land is warm and mellow.

3. Should the season be late work only such sized areas of land at one time as can be seeded before bad weather sets in.
4. Should it happen that work is started before the field is all quite ready, the damp places should be frequently harrowed until the moisture content is just right for it to break up nice.
5. Roll all new meadows as soon as they are firm enough to carry the horses. This will greatly increase the yield of clover.
6. Sow mixtures; equal parts of wheat, oats and barley; or equal parts oats, barley, and peas or vetches. They yield more than either one alone and can be used for soiling or pasture if necessary.

SEED

1. See that all seeds are vital; vigorous, suitable and clean.
2. Treat against smut in grain and scab in potatoes with formalin.
3. If in doubt test your seeds.

PROCLAMATION

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or may concern:

GREETING:
A. E. ARSENAULT, Attorney General.

WHEREAS, it has been made clear that an adequate supply of foodstuffs to Great Britain and her Allies is now one of the most critical and essential problems in connection with carrying the war to a triumph;

AND WHEREAS, Our Province of Prince Edward Island by virtue of its agricultural resources and good farming lands, occupies a position of special responsibility and opportunity;

AND WHEREAS, the season approaches which shall determine for another year the amount of foodstuffs which this Province shall produce;

WE THEREFORE, believing it to be the aspiration of Our people to discharge every responsibility as in the past, and confident of their willingness to take advantage of the opportunity involved, to the end that the cause of righteousness for which we struggle may be advanced, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Executive Council for Our said Province, to appoint, and do hereby appoint a week of Dedication and Preparation for the period of production

approaching, beginning on the twenty second day of April instant.

AND WE DO HEREBY URGE and request the careful consideration and patriotic co-operation of all Our people in the matters herein set forth to the end that each and everyone may prepare to do all that is possible to increase the production of foodstuffs and particularly to assist in the formation of Greater Production Committees and in the work ensuing therefrom: AND WE DO HEREBY FURTHER URGE and request that each and every Clergyman in Our Province shall from his pulpit on Sunday the fourteenth day of April instant, set forth the facts of the food situation as it affects the Allied cause, emphasizing the responsibility resting on this favoured land, and invoking the blessing of Almighty God on the human efforts put forth towards production, that they may be blessed by Him: Who alone giveth the increase:

ALL OF WHICH PREMISES all Our loving subjects and all others who know it, or may in any wise concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly:

WITNESS: Our trusty and well-beloved His Honour Augustine Colin Macdonald, Lieutenant Governor of Our said Province, in Council, at Charlottetown, in said Province, this tenth day of April in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and eighteen and in the Eighth year of Our reign.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

JESUS REQUIRES CONFESSION AND LOYALTY

(Mark 9:27-38)

April 14, 1918

"Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."—Mark 8:34—Golden Text.

The intense hatred and open opposition of the Pharisees for Jesus was now having its effect on the people and the multitudes were beginning to desert him. The Pharisees said, "If we let him alone he will win the hearts of all the people, and the Romans will come and take our place and our nation." Their jealousy would not let them see with unclouded eyes. The people too could not grasp the idea that Jesus was the Bread of Life, although they followed him for the loaves and fishes. They said, "Is not this the carpenter, the son of Joseph and Mary? How can he now say 'I am come from heaven?'" But the disciples, we let him answer he saw that his teachings had not been in vain. He had steadily taught these men by a program of instruction showing a definite plan. He had called them to be his helpers and pupils, won their confidence and love, then in the Sermon on the Mount he put before them an ideal which he demonstrated by his own life and power. He then sent them out to preach, to learn for themselves by practice. Finally he took them aside and asked them "Who am I?" Peter answered for the Twelve, "Thou art the Christ." This is the first great truth he now gives them—that he must suffer and die. He had spoken of these things before in veiled language, but this is his first open announcement of his coming death on the cross. He has

plainly accepted the fact as the will of the Father, and why he tells his disciples. Yet another great truth follows—his followers must suffer too. Not only must Jesus suffer death, but Peter and all followers of Jesus must be ready to die also if need be. In verse 35 he tells them that he whose only care is to save his natural life shall lose his spiritual life.

KNOWLEDGE NECESSITATES LIKENESS

What does it mean to know Jesus? Here is the guiding word from the Apostle John: "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar." Then how many of us know him? "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not...." Then knowledge implies obedience. There can be no knowledge of Christ without obedience. Without obedience we may have a few ideas about him but we do not know him.

What is obedience? When one man obeys another it is implied that he subjects his will to the will of the other and works in harmony with its demands. The oarsman in our university boats have to subject their wills to the will of the stroke man, whose stroke determines, and controls the rest. The oarsman have but one will. That is obedience, a will attuned to the will of another, and without that attuning of the will no knowledge of Christ can ever be gained.

"He that loveth not, knoweth not God." Then how many of us know him? No love; no knowledge! May we not slightly alter the former words of the Apostle, and read it thus—"He that saith, I know him, and loveth not is a liar." It would be just as reasonable for a man without eyes to claim he sees the stars, as for a man without love to claim he knows the Lord. Without love we cannot know Christ. What is love? Love is "good will toward men." Observe good will towards men, not merely good wish; willing good, not only wishing it! To wish a thing and to will it, may be two quite different things. Wishing dreams; willing creates. Love is good will, the willing of good toward all men, the effort to think the best of all men and to help them on to the best. That is love. "He that loveth not.... knoweth not God."

To know Christ, I must obey, and obedience can become a spontaneous habit. To know Christ, I must love, and loving can become a spontaneous habit. To know Christ, I must will as his will. To know Christ, I must love as Christ loves. To know Christ, I must have the habit of his willing and his loving. To know Christ, I must have the habit of Christ. And what is this but to say that to know Christ I must be like him?

So we are driven a farther step on towards our conclusion. The principle arrived at is this, that knowledge necessitates likeness. Have we not abundant proof of its truth? Two unlike cannot know each other. Two men who are morally unlike each other may live together, and neither can possibly know the contents of the other's life. He may be able to name them; he does not know them. How would you describe pain to a man who has never experienced it? He cannot know it. He cannot even imagine it. Pain is known only by the pain-ridden. Knowledge implies likeness. There are women in our midst who,

can form no possible conception of jealousy. They have no jealous substance within them, and they cannot know it. Knowledge implies likeness. To know you must be musical. To know art, you must be artistic. To know Christ, you must be Christlike.

To know Jesus is to share his life! His life is eternal. Life eternal is just Christ-like. This is life eternal, to have life like Christ, to know him in spirit and in truth.—Condensed from "Thirsting for the Springs," by Dr. J. H. Jowett.

"Who say ye that I am?" is the all-important question which no one can avoid answering and the acknowledgment of God in Christ, as Browning tells us, solves for us all questions in the earth and out of it. "These are written that ye may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye may have life in his name," wrote John.

If you will come to Jesus as Peter came to him, not knowing him to be all that he is but believing in him enough to trust him and to follow him, to be his pupil, learning from him day by day, seeing his gracious deeds and hearing his wondrous words, the conviction will force itself upon you eventually as it did upon Peter, that he is none other than the Christ, the Son of the living God. To be much with Christ will inevitably end in knowing Christ.

If you commit yourself to Jesus that Christ, Jesus the Christ commits himself to you. For whosoever shall not be ashamed of him and of his words, the Son of man shall not be ashamed of him, when he comes in glory of his Father.

This will furnish some seven thousand young men on the farms during the period when farm labor is wanted and city students can get in touch with proper authorities to enable them to work on farms.
