SENT UP FOR TRIAL

At The Next Session of Supreme Court

FATE OF F. MCKINNON.

She Testifies on Her Own Behalf and Contradicts Evidence of Prosecution.

At Georgetown on Thursday, May 2nd the court was occupied mostly all day in taking evidence in case of the Crown vs. Flora McKinnon charged with burning the barn of Murdock McKinnon of Heatherdale.

The examination of witnesses showed that numerous fires had occurred at Heatherdale recently. Suspicion strongly pointed to the prisoner.

The prosecutor Murdock McKinnon swore that he had been at enmity with him for some time and that in burning of his barn there was strong suspicion of her being the guilty person. He also accused her of poisoning his cats. She replied that he had to prove it.

The prisoner swore that the time the cattle were poisoned she had bought no paris green nor had she any in the house. Lizzie McPhee swore that the prisoner told her at the time that the cattle were poisoned the prisoner had a can of paris green in the house.

Murdock McPhee swore that the prisoner told him she saw the fire the night it happened. He asked her why she did not report it when she saw it? She told him that at the last fire when she reported it the only thanks she got was to be blamed for it.

Lizzie McFee (recalled) swore that after the burning of the barn the prisoner requested her to go to Mr. McKinnon and tell him that she would give him a cow and she would not trouble him any more if he would let her go this time.

After hearing the evidence Magistrate Blanchard sent her up to the Supreme Court for trial.

Mr. Geo. S. Inman appeared for the crown.

Mr. Alder Rehaut appeared for the prisoner.

Mr. L. J. Miller was a passenger by the Princess last night returning from Dalhousie, Halifax.

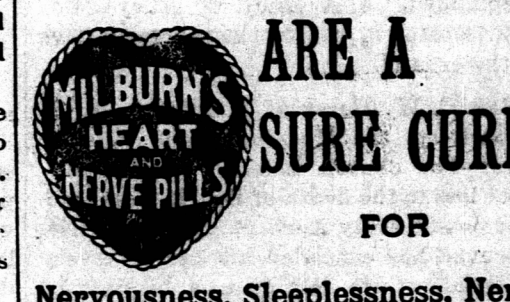
Mr. J. M. McLeod, formerly of J. M. McLeod & Co., Boot and Shoe dealers, is in the City for a few days.

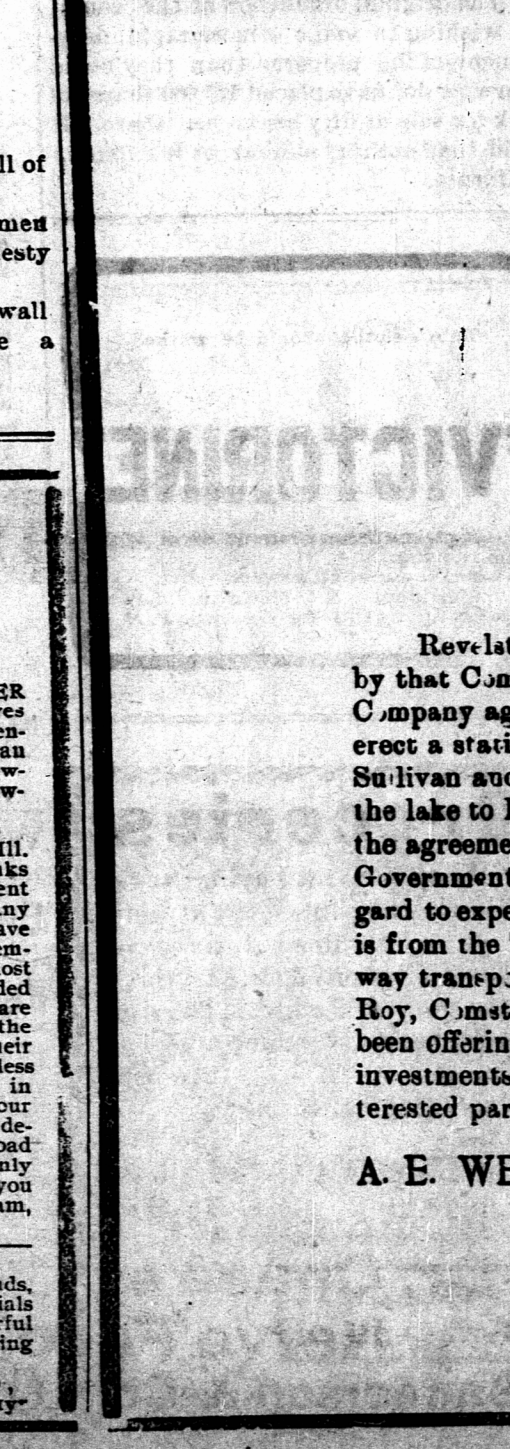
