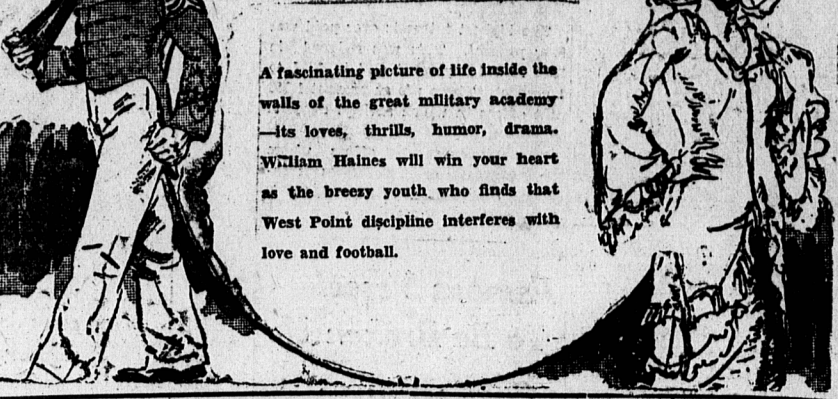

C. P. R. OFFICAL HERE—Mr. G. E. Carter, the new Distric Passenger Agent of the Canadian Pacific Rail- way, of St. John, N. B., was in the city yesterday, his first visit to the Province since his appointment to the important position he now oc- cupies. Mr. Carter is no stranger to Prince Edward Island, having as travelling passenger agent frequently visited Charlottetown five or six years ago. He is thoroughly acquainted with railway conditions in the Maritime Provinces and anticipates consid- erable development in both freight and passenger traffic in the coming sea- son. At present in St. John the C. P. R. have been busier than for many years. The development of the ocean traffic has been very considerable, and on Sunday a steamer from Liv- erpool is expected with overseas passengers. Asked about the proposed connecting up of the C. P. R. on the mainland with Prince Edward Island via Brule, Mr. Carter said that he had no information on the subject so far, but he felt that it would help freight traffic for the C. P. R. very considerably, and in the course of time might develop a considerable tourist trade.

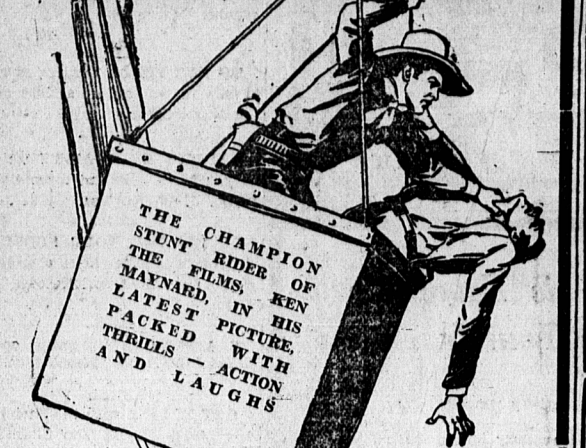
